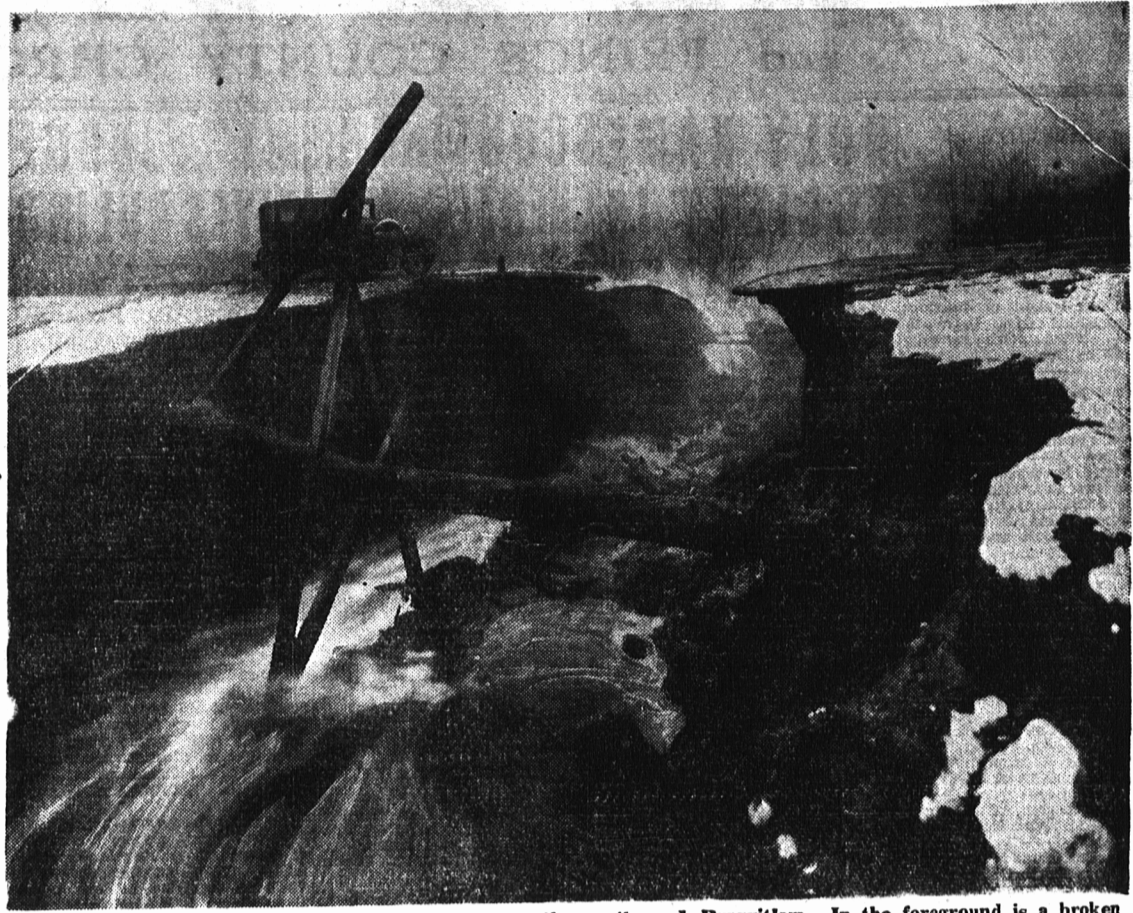

By JOHN LODWICK ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 4 (Special) Crack lawn bowlers from across the sea, from England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland will play in the international matches here again. America's and Canada's best wintering in the Statesmen City Play will start early in February to continue through the Valentine month. The Mirror Lake links where the contests are to be played will be a mecca for Dominion tourists sojourning here.

More than 1,500 Canadians have already registered at the City Information Bureau to remain here until the backbone of winter is broken. More than double that number will have visited St. Petersburg before the end of March.

CANADA'S UNSOLVED MYSTERIES

MURDER BY MAIL

MILLER Canadian Press Correspondent (Copyrighted, 1933, by The Canadian Press) SHERBROOKE, Que., Feb. 4.—(C.P.)—In the archives of Quebec police is a docket bearing the legend: "The Mail Bomb Mystery." It concerns an unsolved murder committed through tactics that are almost unprecedented in Canada.

As it is a Tuesday, June 17, 1913, a simple looking package was delivered to the home of Alphonse O. Blodreau on the corner of Sanborn and Wellington streets. The package was addressed to Mr. Blodreau and appeared to be made of cardboard, about six inches long and two inches wide. It was wrapped in brown paper. It was delivered by the postman in the ordinary way.

The package was opened by Mrs. Blodreau and she discovered that it was seriously injured. The house in which they lived, a wooden two-storey structure was wrecked. Investigation by police revealed the fact the package has been mailed in Sherbrooke. Explosion experts called in an attempt to solve the crime expressed the belief that the infernal machine contained nitroglycerin and nitric acid. The package was cleverly made up so when opened the two contents came together, causing the explosion.

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A tiny piece of paper on which were letters, written on a typewriter, was found in the wreckage and was believed to have been the address on the package. It looked like a valuable clue as one of the letters indicated faulty alignment on the typewriter. Police explored this theory but were never able to bring anybody to trial for the crime.

OLD COURT SITS MATTER OF FORM

LONDON, Feb. 4. (C.P.)—Comedy of an ancient tribunal called the "Southwark Quarter Sessions," which dealt with the lawbreakers of Southwark in the days when Shakespeare was a lad, "sat" recently at the Bridge House Hotel, at the Southwark end of London Bridge. It was attended by two top officials of the City Corporation, which is still legally responsible for the court.

One of them represented the High Bailiff of Southwark and the other the City Clerk of the Peace. The latter told the former that there were no cases for trial, and the court rose. This comedy is enacted four times a year. Jurors and justices are solemnly summoned each time, and, in the same notice, told their services are not required. They merely gather for lunch in 1833 the Local Government Act transferred the Court's practical functions to London Sessions.
