If citizens desire to build up a nation of people who are strong, healthy and vigorous, it is but logical that they should avail themselves of every means at their disposal to safeguard the health of our children. The good results of this forward step (X-ray) is surely apparent to all.

**Federal Member Faces Court Suit**

**QUEBEC**, Sept. 11 — Belchase Member of Parliament Louis Philippe Picard (Lib.) stood faced today with a \$33,000 alienation of affections suit lodged against him here by Civil Engineer Pierre Warren.

Warren charged, through his lawyer, that the Liberal member of the Federal Parliament had alienated the affections of his 30-year-old wife while he was away at nearby Valcartier on an engineering project.

Warren lodged his suit for \$30,000 damages plus \$3,000 to pay legal costs incurred by him in straightening out the legal tangles that ensued. Warren first sued for separation, then for divorce, both of which were granted.

The suit read that Mr. and Mrs. Warren had lived happily together until 1944 when Picard had appeared upon the scene and had begun taking Mrs. Warren out. Warren sued in Quebec for separation of bed and board. Mrs. Warren followed suit losing her case, however, Warren was granted separate maintenance by the court.

During 1946, Warren said, Picard and Mrs. Warren went to the Paris Peace Conference to which Picard was a Canadian delegate. There, the charge stated Picard and Mrs. Warren conspired together to have Mrs. Warren pose as a correspondent to cover up a Quebec newspaper, to cover up the real reason for her presence in Paris.

The 93 paragraph action charged Picard directly with breaking up Warren's marriage. Warren said that he had taken out divorce proceedings against his wife after her return from Paris with Picard, naming Picard as correspondent.

Warren again followed her husband's lead and applied also for a divorce. Again Warren's suit was upheld and divorce granted but the Senate refused to pass on Mrs. Warren's bill.

Warren, in his damage action, bluntly laid forth charges that Picard and his former wife had continued to live together between the time they first met and after his discovery of the affair. He accused Picard of ruining his reputation and demanded that restitution be made by the accused.

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Oscar Drouin, Warren's lawyer in revealing the action to the press, said that the charge against Picard would be presented before a jury in the Superior Court before the end of the fall term.

Among the accusations against Picard was one that the apartment in which Mrs. Warren lived after her separation from her husband, was paid for by Picard, and that it was the same apartment in which the two had held secret meetings before his discovery of the affair.
