CHATTER

Sunday was cold and blustering, a great change from the previous day. My room was even more dispiriting, and I hurried to dress and get out. I would have a simple breakfast at the cafeteria, then go to church. Mrs. Lynch said was only a few blocks away, an Episcopal Church. There is a nice restaurant near about, so I'm very fortunate in my choice of a place to live."

I made a little grimace as I wrote that last line—but part of my life must now consist in making Mother happy.

"I shall have no trouble finding work, so don't worry. And now that I am where I am not know, I shall feel much more independent about it. I am afraid I have a good deal of fake pride, Mother dear, but I could not endure to meet the boys and girls I used to know. It was too hard to answer their questions, to listen to their condolences.

"The last time I saw Claudia—her mother had died—she said on your soon. She seemed quite sorry when I told her you had gone upstate with an aunt who owned a place. It seemed as if when Aunt Susan talked about it, I should feel that I am so glad you are happy with her. Neither of us can be quite so happy without Father, but it is lovely to think that you are so comfortable, and that you and Aunt P. E. I. are congenial. I think it fine to have dear little fluffy chickens to feed; and as long as you have no heavy work to do, it is probably good for you to help Aunt Susan, especially with her out-door work. You say you have bought some cheap cotton dresses for the work. Be sure and save all your finery for me to make over. The material is so lovely, and costs so much now, that we must save all our old clothes for ourselves. I have plenty for a year, but working every day is hard on clothes.
