Leafs Defeat Rangers 3-1 To Lengthen Section Lead Wings Down Chihawks 4-1

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—(AP)—Toronto Maple Leafs lengthened their lead in the Canadian section of the National Hockey League as they skated to 3-1 victory over New York Rangers here tonight. Leafs won the game in the dying minutes of the final period after Rangers had tied it up.

A crowd of more than 16,000, largest of the season, witnessed a ragged contest, with teams checking hard all the way. Hero of the win was Turk Broda, blond Toronto goalie, who turned in a spectacular exhibition, having no chance on the only shot that got past him.

Harvey Jackson put Leafs out in front in the second period while Art Coulter was in the penalty box. The big winger beat Dave Watson cleanly on a neat passing play with Gordon Drillon and Syl Apps. Toronto held the lead until after seven minutes of play in the third session when Bobby Kirk converted a long pass from Babe Pratt.

A trio of Leafs broke away at centre ice soon after, Pep Kelly drilling home a shot from his wing after taking Red Horner's pass. With only 11 seconds left to play Red Metz ended the scoring on an effort with Horner and Kelly.

their most impressive performance of the new National Hockey League season tonight as they swept to a 4-1 win over Chicago Black Hawks. The victory failed to get them out of the United States division cellar.

A holiday crowd of 9,499 saw Detroit score its second victory of the season and its highest goal total for a single game.

Lanky Gordon Pettigrew split the Black Hawk defence at 9:15 of the opening period for the first goal, and rookie Carl Liscombe took a pass from Larry Aurie for the second at 9:49 of the second period.

Aurie, a leading scorer of the league last season, counted his first goal of the present campaign at 9:25 of the third period while Earl Seibert was in the penalty box. Johnny Gottselig counted three minutes later with the only Chicago score while the Red Wings were short, and Herb Lewis shot the final Detroit goal 59 seconds after.

Fifteen penalties were called. Detroit team drawing eight of them. At one time in the second period six players occupied the penalty box.

Decide Against Interfering With Hockey Ass'n

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 25—The Maritime Provinces Branch, Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, decided at an executive meeting tonight it would not interfere with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association control of hockey in the Eastern Provinces.

Instead, the meeting decided, it would cooperate with the M. A. H. A. in all ways possible.

(Following the action of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association in breaking away from the A. A. U. of C., the M. A. H. A. broke away from the M. P. B. this summer over rulings on what should constitute an amateur.

A resolution that the M. P. B. should not attempt to organize hockey in the Maritimes in opposition to the M. A. H. A. was presented by Sheriff C. D. Shipley and seconded by J. B. Carrigan, Summerside, Prince Edward Island vice-president.

The other vice-presidents, D. W. Fraser of Amherst and A. Chisholm, Moncton, N. B., agreed as did President Tom MacDonald of Halifax. MacDonald differed in minor details but agreed to cooperative effort would gain the best results.

The resolution was: "That this branch do not proceed to organize hockey but that we lend our assistance to the M. A. H. A."

And whereas, some of the other branches of the C. A. H. A. are taking out amateur cards, we recommend that hockey players playing under the M. A. H. A. procure amateur cards from this branch and further, if any clubs do not wish to pay the fees charged by the M. A. H. A. and are not interested in playing in competition for the Allan Cup or Memorial Cup, that they have the right themselves to organize and play hockey outside the M. A. H. A. and that they affiliate and be issued amateur cards by this branch if they so desire to retain their amateur status;

And whereas there seems to be a difference of opinion among clubs and sport followers as to the method of conducting sport within the branch, that at the semi-annual meeting which is to be held in the month of May each year, we invite all those interested in amateur sport to attend that meeting in May, 1938, and that the present officers of the branch tender their resignations and thereby give the meeting a free hand to set up an organization that will be satisfactory to the Maritime Provinces and to elect such officers as the meeting may desire."

Warrington Wins Decision Over Bonin

MONTREAL, Nov. 25—Andre Lenglet, ponderous French heavyweight champion, gained a technical knockout over Al McCoy of Boston tonight in the second round of their scheduled 10 round bout. Referee Tommy Sullivan awarded the fight to Lenglet with McCoy on the floor for the third time from a succession of right-hand blows.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25—Nova Scotia's battling Tiger Warrington who has earned himself two Canadian boxing titles, won an eight round decision tonight over Gene Bonin, New Haven, Conn., heavyweight.

Warrington, giving a way 19 pounds to his adversary, took the decision after eight rounds of heavy slugfng that never gave him a chance to display the wares that have given victory in all but three of 60 fights.

The Tiger, a native of Liverpool, N. S., jolted and jarred the big blond, but never got a chance to put him away. Several times he had his opponent teetering but Bonin, more of a slugger than a boxer absorbed all the punishment given.

Bonin held off most punishment by wrapping his long arms around the negro who was unable to get far enough away to land some solid punches he had in store.

The lethal punch developed by the negro in his six years of campaigning was never given a fair demonstration. He drew blood from two cuts below the left eye of Bonin who fell once to the canvas while grappling in a clinch, but the Tiger never was able to unleash the attack that has earned him the title of Maritime Canada's best fighter since the days of Roddy McDonald of Cape Breton.

Three-Corner Tie In English Hockey League

Dunc Cheyne of White, Sask., Earl Nicholson of Port Arthur and Joe Shack of Winnipeg scored for Harringay.

Manager Cecil Hart said little Aurel would be out there tomorrow, and in all likelihood would play against New York Rangers here Saturday night.

Dizzy spells have bothered the veteran left winger since he landed on his head in an upset with Buzz Boll of Toronto Leafs one week ago tonight, and he remained home when the team went on the road. Hart denied the rumors and said Joliat would be back in his regular berth next week at the latest.

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Johnson Is New Idol Of Americans

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—Manhattan's most rabid hockey fans, the gallery boys from the East and West sides who shout for the Amerks, had a new idol of the rink to cheer for today—Ivan (Ching) Johnson.

The bald eagle of the backline, nervous as a debutante but still the same glamorous figure in the glare of the ice floodlights, came back to the hockey wars Tuesday night wearing the brightly hued trappings of the New York Americans.

Johnson, discarded recently by New York Rangers after 11 years service, ranged behind the Amerk blueline with Happy Day, transferred at the start of the season from Toronto and like Johnson experiencing his first season with another club since turning professional a decade ago.

The pair formed one of the stoutest rearguard combinations Amerks have dug up since Red Dutton took charge of the outfit three seasons ago. Johnson bowled over the opposing Detroit Red Wings with great enthusiasm as the crowd of 12,000 roared encouragement.

The Americans won the game 3-1. Victory or defeat really played second fiddle, however, to Johnson's unveiling. A faint cheer that swelled into a roar when Americans first took the ice and the veteran was sighted indicated what was in the minds of most of the gathering.

The foundation of Madison Square Garden shook when Johnson not his first true bodycheck, a jolt to the shoulder which sent Larry Aurie spinning 15 feet. Outbursts of applause punctuated the game throughout and were dimmed by the veteran's solo rush in the third period when he missed scoring by an eyelash and wound up in the cage behind goalkeeper Normie Smith.

Manager Dutton made the bald eagle take his regular turn on the defense throughout as Johnny Gallagher, regular blocker with Day, is suffering from a badly wrenched ankle.
