WITH respect to the proposed location of a wharf between Cape Traverse and Gordon's Point, Observer writes:—While the wharf is at present so good, we have lots of water on the west side of the old wharf, but unprotected and therefore of no use to us. We have at least fifteen to twenty feet there at the lowest tides. If the Government would only extend the wharf due west about five hundred feet and then put a break or L on to make a dock, we would have at least thirty feet of water at low tide and as the present wharf has been there about 30 years and no sand has lodged there, it never would. The reason the eastern side of the dock sands up, is an account of a sand beach between Government Point and the wharf, and when we have heavy west to northwest winds, it blows over the way into the channel where the tide from the river lodges it all along the side of the wharf. If the dock was made on the west side of the wharf there would only be the rise and fall of the tide to contend with, no extra tide coming from the river.

generally shaping their course for St. George's Bay as their just berth, and a little later in the season with easterly winds and currents making their way westward to the narrow part of the Strait filling up the Bays, and grounding in a considerable depth of water, the board ice forming between them and the shore. The pressure or absence of this immense body, the earliness or lateness of its coming and departure, effect the climate, the seasons, and the health of the inhabitants to a remarkable degree. Its chilling, cold and benumbing influences extend beyond its neighborhood, over the whole of this part of the country, its course not being too little impelled by those mighty forests with which Nature covered East Point at one period, but now largely and too much removed by the hand of man. Let not the reader from other parts imagine from the foregoing description of our winter climate, that our inhabitants are a stunted and shivering race, akin to the Samoyedes, the Lapplanders or the Esquimaux, clothed in furs during the winter season. Whether from the survival of the fittest, or from hereditary influences, more 48 coats and 11 and 12 of boots are required and imported here than to any other portion of the Island, and a No 14 boot has recently been constructed for a political son of Vulcan in this neighborhood. Our bloods drive their fast horses, they attend parties risk hobnobbing, they escort the single females from church on Sunday evenings, they marry and are given in marriage like the inhabitants of a more genial climate, and the regions of our winter climate only put iron in them—the blood and mettle in their veins.—
