Easter Holidays.—The P. E. I. Railway issue excursion tickets on the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th April, 1900, good to return on the 16th April, 1900. A special train is also to be run between Tignish and Charlottetown on the 14th April, and special cheap fares will be in force on all trains on that day. See hand bills. 31st April 13.

THE Market yesterday was very poorly attended owing to the dreadful condition of the roads. Very little hay was offered and prices were good, 45 cents being paid. Potatoes were not in demand and the buyers were only paying 20 cents. A few loads of oats were offered and prices were about as last quoted. Very little pork was on the market and 6 1/2 to 7c was paid. Butter is reducing in price and a good quality was sold for 20c. Choice lots exchanged hand at 28 cents.

HALIFAX MARKETS.

The scarcity in butter continues, and high prices still prevail. Some Canadian rolls are coming in, which dealers sell wholesale at 24 cents. Very little creamery is arriving, what there is coming as prints and wholesaling at 27 cents. The effect of the recent decline in the West has not yet reached Halifax, nor will it for a couple of weeks. Butter has been bought in Montreal at lower figures than those prevailing here and when this arrives there will be a reduction. There is no Nova Scotia dairy butter in tubs on this market. Some fadder cheese is now being made. Stocks in Halifax are exceedingly light.

Beef promises to be higher this Easter than last. The tendency is upward and dealers fix the wholesale extremes at 7 1/2 cents to 8 1/2 cents, for heavy on foot, an advance from a former minimum of 7 cents. Light beef is quoted at 6 cents and 7 cents. Pork is up a full half cent, and the best mutton is advanced to 7 and 8 cents.

As high as 8 cents has been paid in Halifax during the past winter, for green hides, but the other extreme has now been reached, and 7 cents to 7 1/2 cents represents the range, according to quality. Leather is higher than before compared with hides, but the manufactured article will soon follow the descent of the raw. Woolskins are worth from 80 cents to \$1, and calf skins are quoted as before, at 60 cents to 65 cents.

There is a considerable quantity of potatoes from Prince Edward Island afloat. The retail price ranges from 35 to 45 cents, according as they are from the Island or the mainland.

Eggs, wholesale, sell at 11 cents and 12 cents, a figure at which they will probably remain for some little time.

Corn has advanced 5 cents per bushel during the last week or so, but millers here still keep the jobbing price at about \$2.30 per barrel. Middlings and feed generally are unchanged. Hay is bringing satisfactory returns.
