TO SETTLE CLAIMS BETWEEN BRITAIN AND U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 15—A treaty for the settlement of claims between Great Britain and the United States, some dating back to 1776, has been approved by Secretary of State Knox and will be put up to the senate for ratification. After that it will go to the British foreign office. The treaty provides for four arbitrators and an umpire.
