Hints for the Motorist.

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"Lost Articles" In Housings

One Of The Dangers Of An Overhauling

EVERY REAL DANGER to car mechanism lies in the accidental dislodgement of nuts, cotter pins or even small tools into clutch, gear housing or into the crankcase. To reduce size and weight, housings are designed with very slight clearance with the moving parts which they enclose and a very small metallic object, dropped into one is pretty certain to be caught by a moving part, damaging it or even breaking through the housing itself. When the cover is removed from a housing, great care should be taken that small objects are placed where they cannot fall into it, for even if it is known that they have done so their removal is usually very difficult on account of close clearances and sometimes impossible without disassembling. Objects, the entrance of which is unknown, which includes nuts that fall off moving parts, teeth stripped from gears and the like, are almost sure to cause damage ultimately, as they have an almost mendacious habit of working around where they can do the most harm. There have been instances of nuts and similar objects being introduced into housings hidden in the grease with which they were packed, which was stuffed into the case in large handfuls and to guard against this possibility, lubricant should be carefully inspected as it is supplied or still better run through wire gauze.

CHOKED MUFFLER MAY CAUSE OVERHEATING



G. P. S. writes: The engine of my car overheats, although it has plenty of power. The valves and spark timing are O. K., the brakes do not drag, the fan-belt is tight and there seems to be good water circulation. Can it be possible that the overheating is caused by the muffler being choked? This has run 12,000 miles without cleaning?

Answer: We do not believe that the overheating is attributable to the muffler. For if it was badly choked to cause this trouble, engine power would be noticeably diminished. We think that your system rather than in the engine itself. Before you remove the circulation yourself. Remove water from a hose at the filler opening and see if it runs out freely in a full sized stream from the lower outlet. If not, the radiator passages are partly closed. Try out the pump by seeing if it will throw a full sized stream out of the upper rubber connection, when detached from the radiator and the engine speeded up. It ought to send a stream 15 or 20 feet. If your engine jackets get hot before all passages of the radiator are about equally warm, circulation is poor.

GRINDING NOISE AT A CERTAIN SPEED



J. M. J. writes: My car makes a grinding noise at a speed of 15 or 17 m. p. h., but at no other speed. The noise I think is in the differential, and I had it taken apart and inspected, but with no improvement. The representative of the car sell me that this is a not uncommon faulting of this make. Can you tell me how this noise can be eliminated?

Answer: We are sorry to say that we cannot but we do not believe it arises from the differential and we never heard that this make of car was subject to it. Ordinarily a noise that occurs only when a car is driven at a certain rate of speed, is due to the vibration of the same part in sympathy with the vibration of the engine. Crank shaft vibration of this kind often makes an engine "buzz" at certain speeds. The drive shaft may "whip" owing to the fact that it is the most likely theory that your case is that the whip of your drive shaft causes the driving gears to grind. You better see that the propeller shaft bearings in the neck of the rear-axle casing, are adjusted without unnecessary play. Also see that there is nothing else about the car that is loose enough to take up engine vibration.

ADELINA PATTI MADE FORTUNE FOR YEARS HER INCOME WAS MORE THAN \$150,000 ANNUALLY.

There is only one Niagara, and there is only one Patti. Such was the tribute which Jeanette Lindgren paid to her great successor in opera.

When she was seven years of age Patti astounded the musical world by singing grand operatic arias at concerts. In her first season her share of the profits was \$20,000 but the fact that she had begun to earn large sums of money while still in the nursery made no difference to her. She remained true to her dolls and her play things.

On one occasion she asked her brother-in-law, who managed the concert tour, for a doll. He paid no particular attention to her request and forgot all about it. When the concert was about to begin, Adelina declared that she would not sing unless she had her doll. The hall was crowded but nothing could alter her decision—nothing but the doll. The manager was compelled to run out and buy one at the nearest toy store. When it was handed to her, Miss Patti cried her tears, and then ran on to the platform and created the usual enthusiasm. Included in the concert party

was Ole Bull, the Norwegian violinist, who had a painful experience of one of Patti's occasional lapses of temper. She had a decided liking for champagne and Ole Bull thought fit on one occasion to refuse to give her any. Adelina adopted her own method of showing her annoyance. With her pretty little hand she administered a sharp smack to the cheek of the astonished violinist.

Patti however, was always impulsive. She had a great dislike for the gramophone and it was a long time before she could be persuaded to allow a record of her voice to be made. Two or three days later she was descending the main staircase of her wonderful Welsh home Craig Nos Castle, to the hall (where the instrument had been placed, when the tones of her own voice fell for the first time upon her ears.

Huge royalties were paid to her for the record, and had she been induced to make gramophone records here she would have been very large. In spite of this however, she was the richest prima donna the world has ever known. For twenty years—from 1861 to 1881—she earned from \$150,000 to \$175,000 a year (roughly \$3,000 per week). When at 18, she made her operatic debut in London, she was engaged to sing twice a week at Covent Garden at a fee of \$1500 per performance. At her zenith she seldom sang either at a concert or in opera, for less than \$5,000 and once was paid \$4,000 for singing "Home, Sweet Home."

Neither did she take any risks in getting the money. Mapleson the American impresario who agreed to pay the singer's fees in advance was short one evening by \$1,000 of the required \$5,000. She agreed to accept the balance when the doors opened and the money came in from the outside public, but she must have the money before she dressed.

ACTIVITIES OF WOMEN

Women are more religious than men. Women are now admitted to the bar in Scotland. In Scotland women outnumber the men by 185,000. Mary Pickford carries a life insurance for \$1,000,000.
