The rail and utility issues ignored adverse reports on car loadings and electric power production which serve as reminders that business will be at a low ebb. The principal change in the situation is one of sentiment which may prove to be what was needed. Most with the tendency now to make the most of favorable developments the appearance of further cheerful news may carry prices higher in which case we would watch the volume for an indication as the Dow Jones industrial averages approach the highs of 1927. Otherwise we would expect a period of consolidation pending later developments in the situation.

CHINA CONFISCATES ESTATE OF FORMER PRESIDENT

PEIPING, June 25.—(U. P.)—The estate of Yuan Shih-kai, first President of the Chinese Republic, has been confiscated by the Chinese government and will be turned over to the higher middle school of that city for educational purposes.

The estate includes fine buildings and orchard lands, which the school plans to rent to present tenants, obtaining revenue for education. Yuan Shih-kai, after becoming the first president of the Republic, turned reactionary, and for a brief period made himself emperor.

TWO MILLION BRITISHERS TAKE UP HIKING. LONDON, June 25.—(U. P.)—Hikers in England now number more than 2,000,000, according to a recent estimate by J. E. Walsh, editor of "The Hiker and Camper."

The steady increase in the number of hikers is seen by Walsh as a revolt against modern industrial conditions, the workers fleeing to the country during the week-end to escape the noise of the city.

The popularity of hiking, it is said, also has brought a better understanding between the villager and the city worker.

WHAT LIVERPOOL LIKES. The Dominion Fruit Branch has just received a copy of the Empire Marketing Board report of its survey of the apple market in Liverpool, England. It finds that the Liverpool market prefers the variety Virginia York Imperial best, then in sequence the more familiar Jonathan, Newton-Pippin and Winesap. In boxed apples preference is for Spitzberger, Delicious, and McIntosh Red. Barreled apples in general demand are: Baldwins, Kings, Greenings, Blenheim's, Cranberry Pippins; while in addition Stark and Fallwater are generally stocked by the retailers. Over 200 retailers were interviewed during the survey, and the Liverpool market comprises a population of about 1,300,000—Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa.
