EASTERN NOTES.—The sad drowning accident which happened here on the night of the 3rd inst., has overshadowed every other event. About ten o'clock at night, two young men, Arthur Arbing and James Beaton, left Black Point, to return to East Point in a dory with a sail, and a gale blowing from the south east. They never reached their destination, and cries of distress being heard after their departure, a general search was made. The dory was found some four miles to sea bottom up, with the sheets securely fastened which told the sad tale. A lead sinker which had been in the dory was found in 9 feet of water off East Lake beach showing where she was capsized, and the body of Arbing was found in the land wash on the 5th inst. under McDonald's, Black Point. He undoubtedly made a brave struggle for the shore, being a good swimmer, and sank exhausted in the breakers. His body was taken to Charlottetown by his father where he belonged, but he lived at East Point for some years. Beaton's body has not yet been found. He was the eldest son of James J. Beaton about 21 years of age. Arbing was about 23. Both men were of fine physique in all the vigor of early manhood.—Mrs. McMillan died at East Point, on the 6th inst. She was a sister of the late Captain James Allan McDonald, of East Point, and Capt. John McDonald of Georgetown. Her husband was drowned in the Gloucester schooner, Cecil H. Low, which was wrecked on North Cape Rock in the memorable August gale of 1873, and all hands lost.—Thomas Rose of Lakeville, died on the 6th inst.—Cod-fishing is fair from North River to Little Harbor on the south side.—Nothing doing west from that.
