

LIBERAL CONVENTION HELD IN THE CITY YESTERDAY

A Candidate Chosen to Contest the Second District of Queens County, James McLean the Man Selected By the Delegates. John Wheatley Also in the Race

The Liberal convention to select a candidate to contest the Second District of Queens made vacant by the election of Hon. D. Farquharson to the Federal House, met yesterday afternoon in Wheatley's Hall corner Great George and Easton Streets.

Benj. Rogers, Esq. President of the West Queens Liberal Association presided. F. J. Nash was secretary and there was a large attendance of delegates 55 in all with a full quota from every polling division. The delegates present were as follows:

After the object of the meeting had been explained nominations were called for and resulted in the following: John Wheatley moved by James Howard and seconded by Nicholas, Colwell.

James McLean moved by D. D. Currie and seconded by Allen Livingston. A motion was made that the choice of the convention be unanymous. To this Mr. Wheatley and his friends objected, contending he had been properly selected as the candidate at a previous convention.

TRIED TO KILL SWEETHEART THEN COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Crime of G. A. Darlington, Who Was A Canadian Soldier in South Africa—Left Note Saying He Was Insane and Eternally Lost—Girl Will Recover.

ANN ARBOR, MICH., Nov. 21.—Because Bertha Sheldon allowed another man to escort her home last night from the store where she is employed, G. A. Darlington, a pecker for the Ann Arbor Organ Company, and a student in the University School of Music, shot her in the arm today, and then shot himself to death. Darlington and her had quarrelled over last night's episode. The young man came here from Strathcona, Ont. He served with the Canadian soldiers in the South African war. He was 24 years of age.

STORY OF THE TRAGEDY

Darlington had been keeping company with Miss Sheldon up to a month ago. He claimed that he was engaged to be married to her, but that the engagement was broken off. He was infatuated with the young lady, and last night when he saw the other young man accompany her home, his feelings of jealousy were aroused. This morning he awaited her as she was going to work, and threatened her, unless she took a walk with him and explained to him why she was accompanied to her home by the young man mentioned. They had proceeded about a half-mile south on Main-street, to Hill-street, he became furious. She was frightened, and ran into Chris. Teufel's yard and cried for help.

TEUFEL SAVED THE GIRL.

Teufel hurried her around to the back of the house to prevent the crazed lover killing her. Just then, Darlington must have realized the crime he had committed, for Mr. Teufel heard another shot, and, running to the front of the house, found the would-be murderer lying on the ground, bleeding profusely from a bullet wound in the neck. Death was instantaneous.

Miss Sheldon's wound is not dangerous. Darlington took a prominent part in Y. M. C. A. work here, and was extraordinarily zealous in the cause of religion.

SUICIDE LEFT A LETTER.

A letter was found in the Teufel yard after the shooting. It was signed by Darlington, and read:

"Nov. 21, 1902.
"Notice—Please do not send my body home. Give it to the doctors of the University Hospital. My musical instruments are to go to G. F. Gordon. My books are to be given to the Young Men's Christian Association. My clothing and other belongings are to be taken by Edward Kolaschindt. My gold locket and gold watch to go home. I am insane as ever a man was and eternally lost. Love all my friends and dear ones, good-bye. Love to my darling mother."

Strathcona, P. O. is in the County of Aidington. It was formerly Nanapanee Mills. Darlington was known to several Toronto soldiers, who served in the sixth contingent.
