In Oct. 1918, he was transferred to Ninette Sanatorium, Manitoba, was discharged from there in Jan. 1919, making his home in Winnipeg. On March 1919, he had a severe attack of influenza recovering and in fair health until October, then he seemed to fall but thinking the warmer climate would benefit him, he was sent to Victoria, developing pneumonia, on arriving in that city he was fully recovered and in April 1920, he was transferred to Vernon, B.C. After 11 weeks in that place he passed away on July 10th. Mrs. Pidgeon nursing him all through his sickness.
