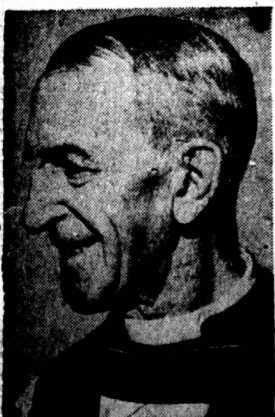

NEW FALL SCHEDULES ANNOUNCED BY T.C.A.

MONCTON - With the change-over from Daylight Saving to Standard Time, Trans-Canada Air Lines has announced its new fall timetable schedules. They include one flight in each direction between St. John's and Gander, Newfoundland, and Sydney. Two flights will be operated each way from Sydney, one to Boston and one to Montreal, Halifax will have three, two to Montreal and one to Boston and return. There will be one flight in both directions from Yarmouth providing service to Newfoundland, Montreal and Boston. Three T.C.A. flights in each direction will serve Moncton and two to St. John's.
