Small imitation houses and barns are used and each is "struck" by the electric fluid generated by the machine and a means of protection plainly demonstrated. Mr. Armitage talked fluently of lightning and considerably enlightened his hearers on the subject, so valuable did his first address and demonstration being deemed by Principal Robertson that a repetition was requested before another and larger class. The P. E. I. Board of Fire Underwriters, before whom a demonstration was also given, were most favorably impressed. Mr. Armitage has been here a week and possesses, besides a keen business ability, a gift of song. He was heard with much pleasure in the First Methodist Church on Sunday last in a sacred number at the evening service.

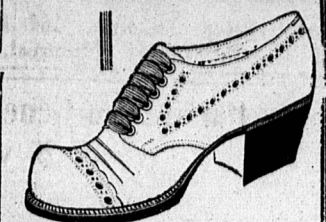

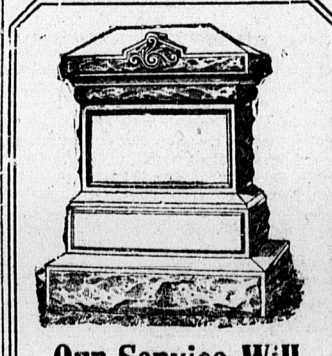
