Marlene Dietrich and Jimmy Stewart At Prince Edward Today and Tomorrow

A new Marlene Dietrich, vastly improved and bearing little resemblance to her previous appearances except in glamorous beauty, when "Destry Rides Again" opens today at the Prince Edward Theatre. Miss Dietrich's almost startling transformation features a picture notable in many other respects, chief among these being the presence of James Stewart, one of the screen's foremost male stars, who plays the title role opposite Marlene. Together they head what is probably the greatest supporting cast ever assembled for a western epic type of picture. Such prominent favorites as Mischa Auer, Charles

climaxes it all by a fist-fight with Una Merkel. The rough-and-tumble conflict is undoubtedly the greatest feminine fist-fight ever put on the screen, and is destined to rank as the best skirted counterpart of the great fight in "The Spoilers". The scene near the end of the picture in which hundreds of the women in the town, armed with rolling-pins, wreck the Last Chance saloon is another highlight scene in a story that has excitement from start to finish.

Outstanding Performances Stewart's work in "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" is equalled if not surpassed by his performance in "Destry Rides Again". Mischa Auer, as a Russian cowboy, Charles Winninger as the town drunk, Brian Donlevy as the dominating gambler, Una Merkel as the bespeaking wife of Auer, and Irene Hervey as the winsome girl, are worthy of special mention.

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Finland, Still Europe's One Bright Spot, Shows World How To Rebuild

IN A Europe agonized by destruction, the brightest spot today is Finland. Once again, she is showing how a democracy should act. Congress had adopted a resolution to refrain from accepting her \$159,398 debt installment due June 15, but Finland offered to pay—even though she was beginning a tremendous reconstruction task.

The Finns are doing more than rebuilding their country after Russian devastation. They are pioneering in the greater task of the rebuilding of Europe that must follow the present terrific tearing down. The Finns' experience will be passed along through the League of Nations and they believe, will be most valuable. For Finland today is a laboratory whose leaders are scientifically working out along humane and efficient lines the problem much of Europe must face.

TEN PER CENT OF FARMS, INDUSTRIES LOST

IF we faced a comparable problem, we should have lost 10 per cent of our farms, our industries, and our forests, and 17 per cent of our water-power installations. We should have to reorganize our whole rail and water communications systems. But first we should have to provide jobs, a new life, homes and happiness for 16,000,000 homeless people of whom 6,000,000 were air-raid victims, 1,000,000 orphans, and nearly 1,000,000 wounded soldiers.

One-eighth of Finland's people 600,000 — are homeless. All must have roofs, and only 150,000 can get them through repair of damaged houses. The remainder, refugees from areas seized by Russia, must have new housing. Also they must have schools, libraries, churches. In meeting these human needs of the average citizen, Finland will spend \$212,000,000. Priority will be given the job of repairing 46 hospitals; soon after will come the building of 20 new ones.

People who remain in existing cities will have built for them modern houses in new suburban areas. Others will live in 8 to 12 new cities housing from 400 to 1000 families each. Factories will be built by the state and operated by wounded soldiers trained in new trade schools.

DEMOCRATIC LAW STILL PREFERRED

SIXTY thousand refugee families are country people. Many already are cultivating tracts loaned by the government, cities, or private owners. The Lutheran Church has given 400,000 acres. All buildings will be of the best quality. The Finns will spend \$300,000,000 on housing alone. Money is being raised by extending property taxes to various institutions hitherto untaxed, such as banks and railways, as well as to property owners with incomes starting at \$800 a year. Should the task prove too heavy for Finland unaided, loans and investments from other democracies will be sought.

The whole problem is being thoroughly gone over in the Finnish Parliament and newspapers. The Finns think that is the best way to get everyone's understanding and co-operation. Rising again from the ruins of totalitarian devastation, the Finns still prefer the democratic way.
