WORK ON SCHOONER.—If present plans are carried out the schooner T. A. Higgins will again be afloat when the ice leaves the Waterford Shores this spring. It will be remembered that this seventy-eight tonnage vessel in charge of Capt. McLeod came ashore at Waterford in the June gale last year having on board 5,500 bushels of oats which were afterwards sold at a sacrifice of ten cents per bushel by reason of their wet condition caused by the schooner getting damaged when it struck the rocky shore in the gale. Mr. Spurgeon Jeffries of Almo has the contract to raise and beach her up on dry land to enable her present owner Mr. John M. Doucette of Waterford to make the necessary repairs to put her again in sea going condition. So far indications are that this work is progressing splendidly.—Z.

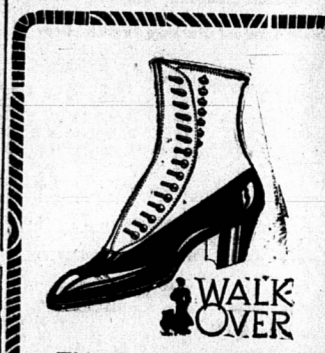
