EASTER

(A MEDIATION by the Rev. D. Lloyd Griffiths, Belfast, P. E. I.) It is safe to say, if Jesus had not been crucified, the world would not have been the grave of Jesus, but the grave of His religion also. If His life had ended upon the Cross, there would have been no Christian faith, and therefore, no Christian Church to preach it. Certain, as the apostles were, of the tremendous resurrection fact, they proclaimed the resurrection with passion and conviction. And, because of their first hand knowledge of their Master's resurrection, death, to them, was abolished, and they exulted over death, as over a prostrate foe. Would it not be in the best interests of the Kingdom of God, if this fundamental faith were always held in the foreground? For, after all, conflict in the overthrow of evil, in the victory of right, and in the establishment of righteousness, lies in implicit faith and trust, in a living, spiritual, victorious Christ. Crucifixion, in itself, could not avail in the salvation of the human race. Two thieves were crucified also, but it was the "crucifixion of deathless love" that turned what seemed hopeless failure, into deathless victory. Hence, the Cross, once a symbol of shame, has become a symbol of victory. Whatever panaceas of human device, are continuously offered for the healing of the world's sickness, it will always remain the glorious privilege of the church, to proclaim that the Cross, still, "towering o'er the wrecks of time, and all that it means, is humanity's only Hope."

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IN MEMORIAM

JAMES W. BRYENTON

On March 15, 1934 the spirit of the late James W. Bryenton of 28 Victory Avenue, Charlottetown took his flight to realms immortal and his body has been lovingly laid in Elmwood Cemetery. Mr. Bryenton was born at Brackley 57 years ago where he lived most of his days and was well known as a successful farmer in this community. He married Caroline Pierce, a sister of the late John A. Pierce. Some few years ago he sold his farm and moved to this city by having accepted a position with the firm of Harold Jenkins, grocer. For several months before his death he was not in good health and for the last six or seven weeks was confined to his bed. A couple of days before the end his illness took an unexpectedly serious turn and he passed peacefully away.

He has left to mourn besides his devoted and sorrowing wife, two children, Alice, a teacher, and Willie, a lad of 14 years, two sisters, Mrs. Patterson and Mrs. Lockhardt in Alberta, and one brother, Hedley in Seattle, U. S. A. The funeral was held in Trinity United Church and conducted by Rev. C. N. Brown assisted by Rev. Mr. Christie of York. The pall bearers were Messrs. W. A. MacLaren, Harry Newman, S. L. Hardy, Ludlow Jenkins, George Grant and Ambrose Mallett. The late Mr. Bryenton was a man highly respected for his sterling integrity and kindly disposition. In the home his comradeship was a perennial delight. He had a sense of humor. But above all he was a consistent follower of his Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, who we have faith to believe has now received him Home with the gracious welcome, "Well done good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

MRS. ALFARETTA COTTON

(South Bend Tribune, March 24) Death Saturday evening brought to a close a life of active service to the community of South Bend, when Mrs. Alfaretta Cotton, aged 77, of 807 Cushing street, died in her home. She had been ill six weeks.

Mrs. Cotton, born in 1857 in Prince Edward Island, Canada, came to South Bend in 1880, and until an automobile accident in 1924 impaired her health, she was prominently connected with church and welfare organizations in the city. She was an active member of First Methodist Episcopal church and of its missionary society; was for eight years president of its women's society and was the first official board. She was for many years superintendent of the local branch of the Florence Crittenton circle; was one of the organizers of the Y. W. C. A., the Orphan's home and the Children's Dispensary, and was among the promoters of Epworth hospital at the time of its organization. Since her accident in 1924 she has been retired to more private life.

Mrs. Cotton leaves a daughter-in-law, Mrs. Orville Cotton of Cleveland, O., and two grand-children, Eleanor and James Robert Cotton, also of Cleveland; five sisters, Mrs. Mabel Durbin of Pasadena, Calif.; Mrs. Maude De Marsden of Las Vegas, N. M.; Mrs. Priscilla Smith, Mrs. Anna Clark and Mrs. George Taylor, all of Prince Edward Island; and three brothers, James, Gordon and Harvey Manderson of Prince Edward Island. Her husband died in 1902 and a son and daughter also preceded her in death.

The body will lie Monday in the Louis H. Orvis chapel and the funeral will take place there at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. Rev. William N. Dunn, a retired Methodist Episcopal minister, will read the service and interment will be in city cemetery.

Careful preparations for death she saw was drawing near were made by Mrs. Alfaretta Cotton, aged 77, who died last Saturday. It was revealed today in her will which was admitted into probate in circuit court. Mrs. Cotton formerly was prominent in church and social welfare organizations of the community.

The will dated Aug. 30, 1923, requested that Rev. W. N. Dunn, a retired Methodist Episcopal minister, "direct the reading of appropriate poems instead of singing" at the funeral services.

It also asked that a spray of white flowers be placed on her casket, named a group of friends from whom pallbearers should be chosen, arranged for the dispatch of a telegram to relatives in Las Vegas, N. M., notifying them of her demise, suggested that the grandsons use his legacy for medical treatment from a particular doctor in New York and provided for other contingencies occasioned by death and the opening of an estate.

The residue of Mrs. Cotton's estate is left to James Robert Cotton, of Cleveland, O., a grandson, while other relatives are bequeathed various personal belongings. Executors are Alfred Beyer and Dr. T. J. Walsh.

Mrs. Cotton, who lived at 807 Cushing street, was injured in an automobile accident in 1924, after which she was forced to retire from her many activities. Funeral services were held, all according to her instructions left in the will, Tuesday in the H. H. Orvis chapel.
