## Favorites Beaten In Two Of Three Races At Night Program

Thrilling finishes and fast times were chalked up in the night racing program of the Goodwill racing meet last night with updates occurring regularly as the competing horses in all three classes battled it out from wire to wire over the flood-lighted racing oval.

A larger crowd than was present in the afternoon saw Bob Danuck race to an upset victory, Wait N' See adding another upset with a smooth trotting performance in the 2:24 classified and Johnnie Kalmuck coming home in front of a six horse field in the last event on the card the 2:26-2:29 classified pace.

Surprises started in the first heat as Shy Ann 2nd going right to the front staved off a half mile challenge of Nellie Worthy by a length in the stretch over Nellie Worthy with C. Albert Budlong a stride behind. The other three were well sprung out. Adding to the surprises Bob Danuck won the second heat in an eyelash finish with Shy Ann 2nd. All during the last half Bob stayed on the outside and in the stretch shaded the first heat winner with C. Albert moving up to third ahead of Nellie Worthy.

Driver Len O'Meara taking Bob Danuck from fifth place on the backstretch won the heat and race for an upset victory as he just shaded C. Albert Budlong at the wire. C. Albert had taken the lead from the start and had registered a first half challenge of Shy Ann 2nd before yielding to Bob Danuck's great burst of speed.

Five brackets of the racing oval will take the word in the Junior Free-For-All at the Exhibition track this afternoon in the feature event of the final day of the Goodwill racing program and some of the keenest racing of the season is expected before the winner is decided.

Four other classes on the card, however, are very liable to steal the spotlight from the free-for-allers. All evenly matched, the Two-Year-Old Futurity looks like anybody's race. The same thing can be said of the second division of the 2:26-2:29 classified pace with ten starters. The third division of the same race is wide open among another ten starters, while the classified 2:19 Trot with five starters should give the expected big crowd one of the finest trotting battles of the entire season. HALIFAX, Sept. 8 (CP)—Jack Halpin of Lowell, Mass., Halifax Capitals' southpaw ace, has been named most valuable player in the Halifax District Senior Baseball League, president Harry Butler announced tonight.

The tall lefthander was the unanimous first-place choice of a six-man selection committee composed of sportswriters and sportscasters. Teammate Buddy Condy of Springhill, N.S., won the award last year with Halifax Arrows.

Halpin had an 11-2 season record for the fourth-place Capitals and was the league's strikeouts king. Joining the team shortly after the season opened, he also played first base or the outfield in sparking Capitals to a playoff berth.

The most valuable players on each team were rated on a 6-5-4-3-2-1 point basis. Runner-up was Dartmouth Arrows Johnny Duarte, another American pitcher, with 16 points.

Two of the remaining top six were Marliners, Phil (Skip) Ferguson, Halifax Shipyards lefthander, of Reserve, N.S., was third with 16 points. Fourth place went to Liverpool Larriers' playing coach, veteran Danny Seaman. Kentville Wildcats' Hal Burby and Middlesex Cardinals' Paul Bulger, both Americans, were fifth and sixth, respectively.

## Mile In 2.09 3-5 Said To Be Best Ever Paced By Maritime-bred Gelding

Featured by the great pacing performance of Dr. Temple Hooper's four-year-old Billy McVeigh, who paced a mile in 2:09 3-5, the Goodwill racing program got off to a flying start yesterday afternoon with a good sized crowd of fans who braved international showers which have been racing and close finishes in a majority of the twelve heats raced. As Rosalie Hooper paced off with the three-year-old futurity in easy fashion, Dale B. won a foot heat battle in the second event on the card, Neil Kalmuck came from behind to win the featured free-for-all trot and Billy McVeigh paced off with his straight heat victory.

But it was McVeigh's performance that stole the spotlight, his mile of 2:09 3-5 was the fastest mile ever paced by a four-year-old Maritime bred gelding and in addition he went the other two miles in 2:11 3-5 and 2:11 times that stamp him as one of the coming greats of Maritime racing circles. Given great drives by youthful Walter Craig, the Hooper-owned horse made it a straight heat win as he came from behind in the last mile to again overshadow his field.

Neil Kalmuck, Willard Kelly's great trotter also shared the spotlight as, beaten in the first heat in an eyelash finish by Marjorie Hanover, she came on in the stretch in the second mile to win by two lengths, trotting the mile in 2:10—another sensational performance and climaxed her victory in Quick Lock and Just Ficka. Dale B. being placed second and Shirley H. Temple third.

The meeting concludes this afternoon with five classes being scheduled, headed by the Junior Free-For-All with five racing stars scheduled to take the word.

It took four heats to decide the winner with Dale B. after winning the first mile and then dropping back to fourth in the next two, coming on to win the extra heat and race.

Dale B. after mapping the rail at the turn made every post a winning one in the first heat, staving off a great closing bid by Just Ficka to win by half a length.

In the second mile Dale again went to the front to lead the field around to the three quarters pole. Here the field were all bunched closely with Dale B. finishing in front followed by the fast closing Quick Lock and Just Ficka. But the latter was given the heat as both Dale B. and Quick Lock were charged with interference, being set back to fourth and fifth positions respectively, with Dick Budlong being placed second and Shirley H. Temple third.

The fans got another surprise in the third heat as Shirley H. Temple came through at the wire to send the race into an extra heat. Dale B. was ahead at the turn to lead to the three quarters before giving over to Dick Budlong. Twenty yards from the wire Dick was still showing ahead but Shirley's closing run nipped the leader just as they came to the wire.

Dale B. couldn't be caught in the mile between the three heat winners. Getting the nod Just Ficka challenged Dale B. all the way to the quarter before making in second place. They remained that way until the seventh-eighths pole had been reached with Shirley pacing into the picture but Dale had too much left, winning by two lengths with Shirley second and Just Ficka third.
