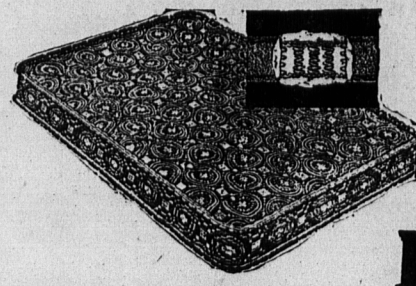

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### HAS BANDED PIGEON

IRON BOUND COVE, Queens Co., Aug. 28.—Apparently pigeons stray from their homes as well as children and dogs. The other day, Burpee H. McAllister of this place found on the shore of the cove a pigeon which was banded on its right leg, the identification numbers being 1932 D 9030, followed by a small triangle. It was white with a brownish tail and blue wings. The bird seemed tired when it was picked up. Mr. McAllister reported, and since has been tame and apparently recovering, with good care.

### ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28.

—With a steadily rising mortality rate the "sleeping sickness" epidemic took its 30th victim today and sent the list of cases to a new high of 225. In the early stages of the epidemic the death rate was only one in 11 cases, but an increase in the number of deaths among those affected placed the ratio tonight at nearly one death in seven cases.

—The consumption of meats in Canada in 1932 was estimated at 1,626 million pounds, an increase of 86 million pounds over the estimate for the previous year. Inspections of eggs for interprovincial and export shipment in 1932 in Canada covered 429,397 cases shipped of which 10,412 cases were for export. Western Canada shipped 327,742 cases, of which 2-

### MUSSOLINI GLORIFIES VIRTUES OF STRENGTH

CUNEO, Italy, Aug. 28.—Friendship and respect are obtained only by strength, Premier Mussolini declared in a speech here yesterday at the annual army manoeuvres. "There is one clear lesson to be drawn from the 6,000 years of man's activity recorded in history—it is necessary to be strong." It is declared in an address in the principal square. "Strong peoples have friends near and far in a time of peace," he continued. "In war they are feared. Weak peoples are alone and neglected in peace and risk being crushed in war. "It is necessary to be strong above all in numbers—if the cradles are empty the nation ages and decays. It is necessary to be strong in courage—never turn back once a decision has been made. "I may speak this way because nobody can challenge the Italian Government and the people's sincere desire for peace, of which they already have given proof."

### EVENT BEARS OUT MOTHER'S FORECAST

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—A mother's prediction that gangsters plotted to wipe out all of the seven men in her family was one step nearer the truth last night. Underworld machine gunners took the life of John Larro, 20, son-in-law of Mrs. Rachael Marazzo who made the prediction, on the doorstep of his home in South Philadelphia yesterday. Two of Mrs. Marazzo's sons and a brother have been slain the last six months, police blame a "numbers (gambling racket) war." None of the killers has been captured. There remain in the Marazzo family now but three sons. "They'll get them, too," screamed Mrs. Marazzo last night.

SACKVILLE, N. B., August 26.—This fall the Mount Allison Academy is opening its Junior School for boys who are not ready for High School work. The work of Grades 6-8 will be offered. Individual attention by skilled teachers will be a feature of the school and the pupils will be advanced in each subject, not by annual grading but as rapidly as their ability and interest permit.
