FINANCIAL NEWS BRIEFS

International Petroleum—Combined output for Sept. 1 down 1.5 per cent from August.

LONDON, Oct. 18—Joseph Bruce Lomax, 74, former owner of the White Star Line and president of the International Mercantile Marine Co. died Sunday.

SPAIN, Oct. 18—Britain and Italy cannot agree on withdrawal basis. Italy says should be equal, man for man, definitely helping Franco's armies.

C. I. O. and A. F. O. L. to meet October 25 to discuss possible basis for peaceful settlement of two year old divided organized labor disputes.

Japanese boycott in London makes definite headway under Labor Party leadership.

Steel—Last week estimated at 63 per cent of capacity.

Dominion Woollens—Operating profit 12 months ended June 30, \$217,000 before depreciation—about \$110,000—bond interest and income taxes as against \$109,546 in preceding year. Annual interest charge accruing since July 1 \$63,500 earned over three times. Working capital \$732,000 up from \$578,141. Indications are that six months interest due Jan. 1, 1938, will be paid when due.

International Metal—Indicated profits first 8 months in excess of those for all last year. To pay 1 1/2 per cent on both 6 per cent 12 and 6 per cent A pfd on November 1st, first in 3 1-2 years.

Lake Shore Mines—Quarter ended Sept. output \$3,935,462 against \$4,037,948 in previous quarter—\$35 basis—tons handled 228,978 and average recovery 15.86 against 226,522 tons and 17.78 respectively.

U. S. Chemical Business—Earnings from this year estimated by

standard statistics 20 per cent higher than 1936.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18—One of the most interesting pieces of week end news is that the result of the French cantonal elections. The present government headed by Chautemps apparently received the endorsement of the public. Both Amsterdam and London Stock Exchanges are better this morning. American stocks were at partly levels or better. There was some encouragement in Saturday's market. We would look for an irregular opening this morning and during the course of the first hour the market will probably receive a further test. If volume dries up on selling we believe some commitments might be made on the long side for a short turn.

TORONTO, Oct. 18—Newsprint for the present time the Canadian producers are holding to the \$50 announcement and deny all moves toward any revision.

TORONTO, Oct. 18—Quebec Manitow—Shaf sinking is currently underway at Quebec Manitow with a depth of 112 feet when the property was visited yesterday. A 500 foot depth is present objective with stations to be cut at 200, 350 and 500 feet levels with first cross cutting to the vein at 350 feet. This is expected to be reached in few months time.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Oct. 18 (CP)—Trading was fairly active on all sections of Montreal livestock markets in early settlement today with prices holding generally steady.

Receipts: Cattle 1180; calves 1247; sheep and lambs 2237; hogs 1606. Good steers sold from \$7 to \$9 with mediums from \$5 to \$6.25 and common kinds mostly \$3.50 to \$4.50. Heifers ranged from \$2.50 to \$5.50. Good cows went around \$4 with mediums mostly \$3.25 to \$3.50 and common butchers \$2.75 to \$3.25. Canners and cutters sold from \$2 to \$2.50.

Good veal calves made \$9.25 to \$9.50 with medium goods up to \$9. Common lights went down to \$6 while butchers brought \$4.50 to \$7.50 and grasses \$3 to \$4.25. Good ewes and wethers, on lamb sections, made \$7.75 with one load up to \$8 and a single small lot as low as \$7.50. Lambs weighing 100 pounds or over were cut \$1 a hundredweight while culls and bucks were cut \$2 a hundredweight. Sheep sold from \$2.50 to \$4.50 with the bulk around \$3.50. Bacon hogs, fed and watered, made \$6.75 to \$9 with sales at the usual \$1 premium. Butchers and heavies were cut 50 cents a hundredweight while extra heavies and lights were cut \$1 a hundredweight. Sows sold from \$6.50 to \$7.25 with odd sows up to \$7.50 and \$7.75.

FINANCE

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—Operations in the steel industry for the current week declined 7.8 points to 55.8 per cent of capacity, compared with 63.6 per cent last week, the American Iron and Steel Institute estimated today.

A month ago operations averaged 76.1 per cent of capacity, while a year ago the rate was 74.2 per cent.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18 (CP)—Increase of \$68,736 was shown today in Canadian National Railways' gross revenues of \$4,013,150 for week ended Oct. 14, compared with \$3,946,415 for the corresponding period in 1936.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18 (AP)—The French franc strengthened its position in foreign exchange markets today, closing up .01 1-2 of a cent at 3.38 1-4.

The pound sterling was down 1-8 of a cent at \$4.95 3-4 while the Belgium belga and Swiss franc were up .001-2 of a cent. The Canadian dollar was up 1-64 of a cent at 1.00 1-16.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18 (CP)—Loss of 3-16 cent was shown on Montreal foreign exchanges today by pound sterling at \$1.97 7-16. The United States dollar de-lined 1-64 of one per cent to 1-16 discount while the French franc firmed .02 cent to 1.38 cents.
