When Mr. Kirkwood of the Review, came to the Island a month ago, one of the Summerside journals expressed the opinion that Charlottetown, and the Eastern end of the Island generally, usually secured the lion's share of any advertising that was supposed to be for the entire Province. There can be no doubt as to the growing importance of Summerside as a commercial centre, and all the western section is contributing to its growth. Both as an import and as an export, Summerside must come rapidly forward. The shipping to and from the West via Summerside, and since this trade is expanding year by year, there is a very bright outlook for the merchants of that thriving town.

Hon. Geo. E. Foster was then introduced and was received with cheers. He was in good voice and was heard to better advantage than his leader. In commencing his address he attacked the Farquharson Government claiming that it was not Liberal and had held on to power by the purchase of Mr. Pineau and bringing back Mr. Peters from British Columbia. Proceeding to Dominion affair he claimed that the present administration had increased the debt instead of decreasing it as was their cry previous to securing the reins of power. He then compared the expenditures under both administrations and claimed that Tarte was the only man who offered an explanation and he said that "the Government is making lots of money and consequently can spend it."

It had been charged at the last election that the Liberal Conservative party were divided and the Liberal party united. We were divided, Mr. Foster said, but we are united now, they were united in their hunger for office but they are divided now. He believed that the Liberal Conservative party and policy would triumph in the coming election, but if that policy were not well grounded and conducive to the best interests of Canada then let it fall. Proceeding Mr. Foster spoke eloquently of the progress made in Canada during the past thirty years, how geographical difficulties and differences of race and creed had been surmounted and the country united in one great Dominion. It was a fit field for the greatest talents and greatest ambition, and with our growing greatness the stimulus to mental and industrial activity was increased. He concluded with an eloquent peroration on the war in South Africa which when it broke out made our people feel that the gun which was directed against a British home anywhere was directed against a Canadian home.
