**THE KING'S BIRTHDAY.**

Sixty years ago tomorrow at Buckingham Palace the eldest son of the late Queen Victoria and the late Prince Consort was born. He received his early education under private tutors, afterwards studied for a session at Edinburgh, then entered Christ Church, Oxford, where he attended the public lectures for a year and afterwards resided for three or four terms at Cambridge for the same purpose. When in his nineteenth year the Prince of Wales, as he was then, spent most of the summer of 1860 in a visit to Canada and the United States. During his visit he opened the Victoria Bridge at Montreal and laid the corner stone of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa.

In 1862 the Prince travelled in the East and visited Jerusalem, and in the following year, at the age of twenty-two, he married the beautiful Princess Alexandra of Denmark. This most auspicious marriage has given us today a Queen, who long before her husband was called to the throne was second only to the good Queen Victoria herself in the affectionate admiration of the British people. In 1875-6 the Prince visited India where he was everywhere acclaimed with enthusiasm among the millions of whom he is now Emperor. Since that date he has many times visited the continent of Europe and some months ago on one of these visits an attempt was made upon his life.

In his long life and career as Prince of Wales, and especially after her late Majesty Queen Victoria sought a measure of seclusion, the Prince was constantly in the public eye and discharged his official duties with such rare tact and graciousness as called forth the admiration of all. When at length the good Queen Victoria died he succeeded to the crown, not only by an undoubted right of legal succession, but with the universal approbation of his many million subjects. He came to the crown at a mature age, in his sixtieth year, rich in experience and the wisdom of years, at a time when the long and glorious reign of the good Queen Victoria had established the throne more firmly in the hearts of the people than ever before in the thousand years of British history.

Since his accession King Edward by his every act has approved himself to his subjects and to the world as a constitutional Monarch, well versed in all that pertains to his high office, and thoughtful of the welfare of his people, and the heart of the British nation has gone out to him in most affectionate regard. It has fallen to the lot of few of our world's rulers to have a father and mother so wise and good and so universally esteemed as the parents of King Edward. For their sakes, for the noble Queen who shares with him the highest station upon earth and for his own great and good qualities of mind and heart, British subjects everywhere will loyally wish His Majesty many happy years of life and will unite to sing with heart and voice:
