SIX SONS IN ARMY - Mr. George Arsenault of Village Green, has returned to his home from Camp Borden where he was under treatment. Mr. Arsenault is a veteran of the last war and has six sons in the army, four of them in England.

NO EPIDEMIC - Prince Edward Island is free of any epidemics at present. Dr. B. C. Keating, health officer, stated last night. However, there was one case of diphtheria in the city recently. There were also two cases of infantile paralysis since the beginning of the year, but neither occurred recently. On the whole the health of the province is exceptionally good.

BOY HIT BY CAR - Arnold Sherman, Granite Street, young Charlottetown boy, was taken to hospital Saturday evening as a result of being hit by a car on Alley Street a short time earlier. It appeared the boy ran out of the driveway into the path of a taxi. The driver of the vehicle applied his brakes but could not avoid hitting the lad. He offered to take him to the hospital but apparently the boy did not appear to be badly injured and was taken home. However, later he was removed to the hospital.

HIT BY CAR - Mr. Malcolm McNeill, 52-year-old resident of St. Catherine's, was struck by an automobile and seriously injured while enroute to service in Canoe Cove Presbyterian Church Sunday morning. He was walking along the road near the church and apparently stepped in front of the car when it came behind him unexpectedly. The automobile was driven by Mr. Albert MacDougall of Canoe Cove. The injured man was rushed to the Prince Edward Island hospital in Charlottetown. It is understood he was suffering from concussion of the brain as a result of the accident.

AIR DETECTION CORPS - Women and air cadets will act as aircraft detectors in daytime while about 50 men will carry out this important job between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. when the Charlottetown Aircraft Detection Corps get into action this week. The establishment of a central observation for the Corps on top of the Charlottetown Hotel is believed to be unique in the many Corps around the world. Mr. G. T. Bourke is regional director of the organization which was formed two years ago. Mr. G. T. Hardie is chief observer for the Charlottetown area.

Approximately 400 members of Prince Edward Island's Reserve Army units, now in annual camp at the Ordnance Grounds and Victoria Park, held a successful church parade yesterday morning. The Doucette lad apparently escaped serious injury but his chum was badly injured and taken to the hospital where it was discovered he had a broken leg.

HEAVY TRAFFIC - Particularly heavy traffic at Prince Edward Island was noted here yesterday on both ferries and by air, the majority coming to attend the Provincial Exhibition and War Labor Board and passengers from Sackville came over on the Borden-Tormentine ferry last evening and traffic to the island was heavier than usual. The inaugural Sunday service of the Maritime Central Airways was both morning and evening flights. The morning flight carried a full complement of passengers. A check on those coming here by bus last evening revealed that visitors arrived from the following places: Toronto, Montreal, Borden, London, Ont., Rivers, Man., Ottawa, Percé, P. Q., and Sackville. In addition to this there were 62 callers at the Travel Bureau yesterday.

LOBSTER SEASON OPENS - Shortly after dawn today the fishing boats along the shores of Prince Edward Island between Borden and North Point were heading for the fishing grounds as the fall lobster season officially opens. Heartened by the announcement that the price ceiling of \$28 a case, which was considered quite favorable, has been removed, fishermen will face the season with high hopes. The removal of the price ceiling is expected to stimulate further the returns from the crustaceans, which proved to be very good during the spring season when the total catch was 47,341 cwt. and the total catch was 16,247. This was an increase of 731 cwt. over the previous year. The heavy demand for lobsters will keep a fleet of fishing boats depleted because of the demand on the go to supply the market.
