GARDINER DECIDES TO CALL SASK. LEGISLATURE SEPT. 4 - REGINA, Sask., Aug. 29 - Premier Gardiner announced last night that the government had decided to issue a proclamation summoning the newly elected legislature of the province to meet on Wednesday, Sept. 4th. It had been understood that the House would assemble on Sept. 3rd but Mr. Gardiner explained that since Sept. 2nd was Labor Day and a holiday it was deemed best to allow another day to intervene. Also the point had arisen that the formal statement in the Cumberland constituency might not be available until Sept. 2nd.

DOUBLE SERVICE Moved by R. E. Mutch. Seconded by Secy. A. J. Mathieson. WHEREAS the several Boards of Trade of this Province have for years advocated the continuation of a double mail and passenger service to and from the Mainland during the whole year.

AND WHEREAS these efforts have met with a considerable measure of success in as much as the Management of the C. N. R. have lengthened the season of double service from year to year.

AND WHEREAS the interruption to our Mail and Passenger Service each year during the Winter Schedule has been such a serious handicap to us.

AND WHEREAS this Board has on previous occasions expressed itself most emphatically on this matter.

THEREFORE RESOLVED that the incoming Executive be requested to use every endeavour to impress on the C. N. R. Management, and on our Federal representatives the necessity of having the Summer Schedule continued throughout the year.

AND FURTHER RESOLVED that we express our appreciation of the fact that the Department has permitted this large and important section of the service being handled from Charlottetown, but fear that the failure on the part of the Department to provide a suitable method of transportation may result in creating so much dissatisfaction that a change may be forced upon them by some of the larger centres, and we may lose the business which is of so much importance to us.

the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick shores.

AND WHEREAS the satisfactory handling of this work requires the service of a large and suitable steamer.

AND WHEREAS the only boat now located at Charlottetown and used in this work is the steamer BRANT, which boat is intended, and in fact used only to supply the local stations and is quite inadequate to serve the larger stations located in the Northern territory.

AND WHEREAS the Charlottetown Agency has a most important duty to perform and is compelled to await the convenience of the other agencies before getting a suitable boat to do their work.

AND WHEREAS during the present season a boat should have sailed carrying supplies to these northern points on opening of Navigation, and was not available until Aug. 7th when a sailing was made from Charlottetown, and then although loaded to capacity, took less than half the supplies needed, and was compelled to return, sailing on a second trip on Aug. 27th.

AND WHEREAS about half these Northern Stations have not at this date received their supplies ordered, and needed for spring and summer use.

AND WHEREAS this means a very considerable loss to our people as the supplies required are very largely the products of our farms, and failure to get these supplies to the consumers at the proper time, means less consumption of our products.

Lobster Pack Will Be Equal To Last Year

OTTAWA, Aug. 29 - The Atlantic coast lobster pack for the spring and early summer fishing seasons of 1929 was 113,333 cases as compared with 101,766 cases for the corresponding period last year and shows an increase of 11,567 cases. The pack by provinces was Nova Scotia 58,654 cases, of which Cape Breton Island produced 16,088, Prince Edward Island 25,063, New Brunswick 19,394 and Quebec 10,252, of which the Magdalen Islands was responsible for 8,967 cases. The increase pack for Nova Scotia was 4,904 cases, New Brunswick 6,000 cases, Prince Edward Island 697 cases, Quebec broke about even having a difference of only seven cases.
