How Can I !!

Q. How can I remedy a cooking food when too much salt has been added?
A. Stretch a clean cloth lightly over the vessel and sprinkle one tablespoonful of flour over the cloth. The flour will absorb the salt if allowed to steam for a few minutes.
Q. How can I restore a waxed surface which has been scratched or spotted?
A. Try washing it with turpentine and then revarnish it with the wax.
Q. How can I easily remove grass stains from clothing?
A. These stains can often be removed by sponging with ammonia and water.

Cook's Corner Household Scrapbook

A Little Borax
Add just a little borax to the water in which sateen or any cotton material having a glazed finish is laundered. It will preserve the shiny surface longer. Add a little to both the soapy water and again to the rinse water.

To remove rain spots that have accumulated on the suede slippers, rub them with an emery board such as is used for manicuring.

COCOA OATMEAL COOKIES
1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour or 1 1/2 cups pastry flour
1 1/2 cups baking powder
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
1/2 cup melted butter, melted
2 cups fine rolled oats
Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Shape in roll about 2 inches in diameter. Wrap in wax paper. Chill thoroughly. Cut in 1/4 inch slices. Place cookies on lightly greased baking sheet and bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F. for 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 3 1/2 to 4 dozen cookies.
