#### INTRODUCTION OF LIBRARIES.

The following sent to the THE GUARDIAN is certainly in line with the opinion of many citizens expressed in our columns from time to time:

Has the movement for establishing a public library for the benefit of the citizens of Charlottetown died a natural death? Or shall we hear a short discussion of this matter periodically only to end in talk? With a nucleus fund of \$5,000, the bequest of the late Thos. W. Dodd, it would seem that a well directed effort should secure for our citizens the advantages of a good library.

The benefits of a library are not among the debatable questions. On every hand this is admitted, and almost every community of a population of two or three thousand, have either secured or are taking steps to secure public libraries.

In the Republic to the south of us, there are not only libraries in the cities and larger towns, but travelling libraries have been established over large sections of the Union. These libraries are very much appreciated, and thousands of the inhabitants enjoy each year the privilege of reading standard literary works that otherwise they would have been unable to procure.

We are pleased to note that the Y. M. C. A. of this city have started a library in connection with that institution and the members in future will enjoy an additional membership privilege viz: Access to a good library. This of course cannot take the place of a public library, for of necessity the use of this library must be restricted to the membership of the Institution. From the schools of today emanates the intelligence of tomorrow and it is pleasing to note that in connection with some of the schools of this province libraries are being established. We are unable at this writing to name all such schools but know of several. In connection with one of the city schools viz: Prince Street, there is an excellent library some account of which may be found in another column.

We trust that increased interest will be taken in the school library then there will be reason to hope that the next generation will not be satisfied without a public library for this the Capital City of our Province.

The British press is already outlining the brilliancy of King Edward's coronation. Already preparations are taking a definite and costly shape. A despatch reports that Mrs. Bradley-Bartlett is having a tiara made in Paris, it is reported, at a cost of \$250,000. It is replica of the diadem which shone on the head of Empress Josephine. Queen Alexandra in having the Kohinoor diamond set in her new crown will make it the most valuable crown in the world, a distinction now held by the King of Portugal. Peeresses are trying to outvie each other in the brilliancy of their tiaras. Lady Kilmorey one of the most beautiful women of London, the wife of the Earl of Kilmorey, who was an intimate boyhood friend of the King; Lady Londonderry, the Duchess of Devonshire and the Duchess of Portland are all said to be spending vast sums in order to celebrate the coronation by a display of jewels worthy of the occasion. It is reported that King Edward at the coronation, will confer the semi-royal title of Duke of Inverness on the Duke of Fife, son-in-law of His Majesty.

A writer in the Scientific American says that the employment of automobiles by the German army during the recent manoeuvres proved a conspicuous success. Seventeen motor cars of various designs were requisitioned, and the military authorities intend to favor their more extensive utilization for the generals in command and their aides de-camps. The steam lorries used for the transportation of ammunition and the commissariat did not prove so satisfactory, but this is probably due to the bad state of the roads and the unusually severe tests to which they were submitted.

The wonderful development of telegraphy during the nineteenth century are strikingly illustrated by some statistics recently issued by Sir W. H. Preece, K. C. B., late electrician to the English Post Office. In 1870 the number of words transmitted per minute was only 80; in 1890 the number had been increased to 450. In 1870, 9,850,177 messages were despatched throughout the United Kingdom, at a cost of \$3,061,505, while in 1900, 89,576,961 telegrams were sent, bringing in a revenue of \$17,200,765. The total number of Government and private cables encircling the globe is at present 1,624, covering a total length of 187,353,172 nautical miles.

The design for the proposed English coin has caused a great deal of discussion of late. In referring to it the press says that the new English coin bearing the head of King Edward VII. will shortly be ready for circulation. The designs have been prepared by Mr. G. W. De Saulles of the Royal Mint, a special audience for the accomplishment of which was granted him by the King. There will be but slight alterations from the designs on existing Victoria coins. The Latin inscription will be the same, the name King Edward the Seventh being substituted for that of Queen Victoria, and such additions carried out as are rendered necessary by the change in the royal title recently sanctioned by Parliament. With respect to reverse side no alteration will be made on any of the coins, with the exception of the bronze money. In this instance the familiar figure of Britannia will be displaced but without the ship and lighthouse.
