Kentville "Wildcats" Has 7 Goal Lead on Crescents

KENTVILLE, March 7.—The Kentville "Wildcats" established a seven goal lead in the first of a two game series for the Nova Scotia championship when they smothered the Halifax Crescents by the one sided score of 7 to 1 in a wild and woolly game, played on soft, sticky ice, at the Arena Saturday evening.

A wild second period, in which the "Wildcats" went wild, spelled the downfall of the Crescents, for Kentville, going like wildfire after they had been held to a 1-1 draw in the opening stanza, broke loose and rammed five goals behind Pop Hanrahan, completely demoralizing the visitors, who failed to break into the score column at all in the last two periods. The game was a riot if ever there was one, a total of 20 penalties, 12 of which, Pete McDonald, Captain of the Crescents and Ernie Mosher, diminutive forward of the "Wildcats" split between them. These two also hooked up in a fist fight during the hectic second period, which took nearly one hour to play. During this same period Harry Butler, of Halifax, who, with Les Lowther, of Amherst, was refereeing the game, got a clip over the head with a flying hockey stick when he jumped to get out of the way of a player near the boards, that laid him out cold for over 15 minutes. Butler, unconscious, was carried off the ice to the dressing room, where he was considered very dangerous for a time but Dr. Burns later stated that he would be all right after a few days' rest. Lowther handled the rest of the game alone and made a fine job of it.

BIG CROWD

Two thousand people, 500 of which came on the Halifax special, 400 from the west and 200 from Kingsport, packed the arena. The big crowd were handled nicely, by Manager Margeson and his staff. The tickets were sold on the Crescents special, and a special section was reserved for them. There was none of the packing and jamming which was so much in evidence last year. The crowd were the most orderly and good-natured that ever attended a game in this town. Both teams seemed to have an equal number of supporters, the "Wildcats" fans seemed to be mainly from Kentville and the west, while Crescents drew the support from the east.

CAPACITY ATTENDANCE AT AMATEUR BILLIARD FINALS

Held Last Night at Lambros Bros. — Fred McMahon Leads Bill Nicholson in First 500 Points of 1000 Point Match For Island Title.

With seventeen breaks over 12, and four breaks for 20, 35, 54 and 20, Fred McMahon, last year's Prince Edward Island champion finished on the long end of the 500—one thousand point elimination contest staged at Lambros Bros. Billiard Parlors last evening. The count at the end of the first half read, McMahon 502; Nicholson, 355.

With McMahon leading off tonight on a 147 point margin, the majority of fans predict a repetition of his last year's performance. However, with Nicholson back into form and shooting his regular game a battle royal is anticipated.

McMahon's run of 54 last evening broke the Canadian Tournament record of 52, but sorry to chronicle last evening's despatch from Toronto informs the writer that Jim Layell of the Central Veterans Club, Toronto, surpassed this break, making a run of 76 while playing a scheduled game with Dave Ritchie of the West End Legion, the particulars of which appear at the conclusion of this article.

Large Crowd Present

Last evening's billiard match was the first 500 points of a series of 1,000 to be played on consecutive nights, the winner to represent Prince Edward Island at Quebec in the Balke Colendar Dominion eliminations for the Canadian amateur Championship.

Long before the given time of the match seating accommodation was at a premium, and at the opening break the large and spacious parlor was crammed to overflowing.

In the early hundreds both players were within reach of each other, but going into the three hundred string McMahon by consistent and heady playing forged ahead to a lead of 67. Enjoying this margin he seemed to shoot more steadily. It was possible to take advantage of a miscue by Nicholson to run a 35 break and on his next turn at the table to make a record run of 54. From then on it was only a question of time, with Nicholson trying, but to all appearances off his game. He made a hard bid, but it was the Provincial Champion's night and he could not be headed.

It may be mentioned that a number of the most spectacular caroms and "in" offs were executed by both billiardists last evening; when the fans eased off for a breathing spell they were rudely returned to their places by an almost impossible shot. It was a match well worth witnessing and only whetted the appetites of the large gathering which looked forward tonight to one of the most spectacular climaxes in the billiard game in this province.

It may be coincident to say in passing that the men now fighting it out in the finals have the record runs in the tournament. McMahon 54; Nicholson, 49; both of which measures well with any runs made so far in the Canadian Tournament.

The following were the best breaks, ten and over: McMahon, 20, 35, 54, 20 and twelve breaks over 12; Nicholson, 16, 12, 12, 13, 17, 13, 12, and eight breaks over 10.

Last night's Toronto match: The record break of 52 made by Johnston, of the West End Canadian Legion Club, which has been untouched in the two weeks of play in the Ontario elimination contest, was shattered unexpectedly last night by A. J. Lavelle, of the Central Veterans Club, who clicked off a spectacular break of 76 in his match with Dave Ritchie, of the West End Legion.

Ritchie is a valiant player and a game loser, but he was distinctly outclassed by his opponent Lavelle, on the other hand, is a splendid position player, which is the essence of break-building. His break of 76 was the kind that can be appreciated by the spectators, since it consisted of a variety of cannons and combination shots, which are far more interesting than breaks made by "red ball players," who are in the majority in most contests. With only 48 to go to complete his 500, Lavelle made another fine break of 45, which also consisted of cannons. He fell down on an easy "in" off the white into the side pocket, and had to go to the table three times before he could get the three points necessary, which he finally did by potting the red in the interval by steady plodding managed to add 43 points to his score. The game finished: Lavelle 500, Ritchie 251. Best breaks:

Lavelle—76, 45, 37, 24, 22 (twice), 21.

Ritchie—25, 20.

Tonight Lavelle will fight it out with Osborne, of the West End Legion Club, for the right to meet Johnston in the finals on March 15 and 16 for the Ontario title. This will be the most interesting match of the series, so far as it is a tussle between the Central and Western Veterans, the winner of which may easily be the Ontario champion.

According to the above, the Prince Edward Island title holder should stand a magnificent chance to enter the Dominion finals.

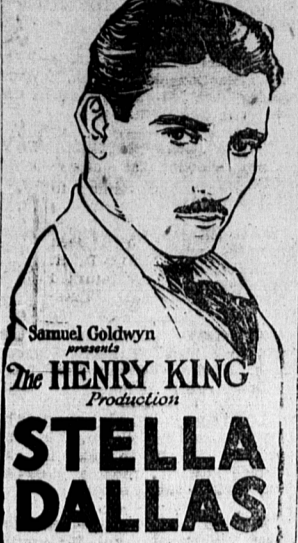

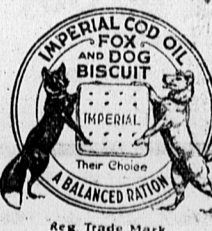
