

SAD SUFFERING IN PORTUGAL

Recent Earthquake Left Many Homeless—Consul Asks American Help. Lisbon Suffered Great Damage From the Seismic Shock.

BOSTON, May 14—(Special)—Advices that reached the Portuguese Consul regarding the earthquake of April 23 in the vicinity of Lisbon, indicate much suffering among the inhabitants of that region and he decided to make an appeal for assistance to the American people.

In Lisbon itself, there was great property damage, and the towns of Sonora, Bonaventura and Salvaterra on the Tagus River opposite Lisbon were entirely destroyed.

Oliver D. Angstadt, a tailor, died last October. A week ago today, it is alleged, his daughter saw the face of her father at a second-story window.

Finally the story became known, and the curious ones began to gather at the Angstadt home. When the crash came a great squad of police was sent to the house.

Residents declare that they saw Mr. Angstadt's likeness on the window pane very plainly. In a way of explanation, it is said that Mr. Angstadt was fond of watching the lightning and some declare that by a strange freak of nature his features were photographed on the window pane and the sun has developed the same.

JURY WAS MISLED IN THE INQUEST

HAMILTON, May 13—Some of the jurors who officiated at the Kinrade inquest are very much dissatisfied at the turn affairs have taken, and there is talk of holding a meeting and passing a resolution to be forwarded to the Attorney General. In an interview yesterday, Mr. Spera, the foreman, said that at the last session of the inquest, the jurors were under the impression that the Crown had twelve or more witnesses to call, and it was a surprise to them when Mr. Pender, announced that the case was closed.

This gave the jury the impression that the Crown representatives had arrived at some understanding, and so as not to interfere with their plans, an open verdict was returned. Mr. Spera said that a draft verdict had been drawn up in which the name of a person was mentioned and a number of the jurors were in favor of returning it, but in view of what had taken place and so as not to tie the hands of the Crown, it was not thought advisable to bring it in. It was also agreed to add a rider to the effect that, owing to the unavailability of the evidence given, the Crown proceeded further with the investigation. In view of this it was expected that perjury proceedings would be instituted or some other action taken. It is stated that Mr. Spera and some of the jurors wrote a combined note to the Attorney General informing him of the stand they had taken with their views with regard to the verdict.

Coroner Anderson said that while the jury had been discharged it could be called together by the foreman and its recommendations would have weight. TORONTO, Ont., May 13—"I never heard of that before," said Attorney General Foy this afternoon, when shown a despatch from Hamilton declaring the jury in the Kinrade case had had a verdict containing a name drawn up. They returned an open verdict after the cross conference with the family's lawyers in order not to interfere with their plans.
