The tunnel is our just due; it means  
life to the Island, and it would not harm  
even the humblest of the objectors if it  
were built!

After all the millions and hundreds of  
millions expended on the Government  
railways, the canals, the Pacific Railway  
and other railways and now to be expen-  
ded on another continental railway, it is  
not too much to ask for a modest ten  
millions to supply the missing link at the  
Capes by means of the tunnel.

### A COMING NAVAL BATTLE.

Admiral Rojestvensky with the  
Russian Baltic fleet of forty-seven sail  
recently passed into the South China Sea  
on his way northward. This Sea is  
roughly speaking 500 miles broad and  
1,000 miles long, and lies between the  
mainland of Asia, the Island of Borneo  
and the Philippines. Somewhere in these  
waters Admirals Togo and Kamimura  
with the bulk of the Japanese navy are  
believed to be awaiting the Russian Ad-  
miral. His venture northward into the  
China Sea can only mean that he has  
been ordered there to offer battle. We  
have no reason to think that Togo will  
decline the challenge or permit the Russian  
fleet to pass. The naval supremacy of the  
East is staked on the issue. The world is  
therefore awaiting one of the greatest  
sea-fights of modern times. It is quite  
probable that the coming battle may take  
place far out at sea and that the result  
may not be known to the world for one or  
more days after it takes place.

Nothing could do so much to restore  
Russian prestige or to change the for-  
tunes of the war at this stage as would a  
Russian naval victory. And in naval war-  
fare there are all sorts of chances. We do  
not know precisely the strength of the  
Japanese fleet after the considerable  
losses of the war, but it is probable that  
in tonnage, men and guns the forces that  
seem about to be engaged are not very  
unequal. Yet scarcely any one expects a  
Russian victory. Many are amazed at  
the temerity of the Russian Admiral in  
going forward to apparently certain battle  
and probable defeat. He will not have a  
North Sea fishing fleet to encounter, but  
the most skillful and redoubtable naval  
fighter of the age, well equipped and  
eager for the fray. Russia is apparently  
playing her last card in the naval war-  
game, in the despairing hope that it may  
win a trick.

After all what is the paper union with  
Canada worth while it takes three months  
to get a carload of freight from Pictou to  
Charlottetown? Let us have the tunnel!

It is obvious that at the earliest possible  
moment one of the winter steamers  
should break the way into Charlottetown,  
the port to which so large a portion of  
the immense freight at Pictou is consign-  
ed. With favorable winds the ice may be  
hoped to soon drift out of the straits and  
with the passage into the harbor once  
opened the Princess could shortly com-  
mence work. It would even then take a  
long time for the winter boats with the  
aid of the Princess to catch up with the  
arrears of freight due here, some of  
which has been lying for three months at  
Pictou.

The Maritime Merchant, ever wide  
awake to what will promote trade and  
inter communication between the Pro-  
vinces, devotes a strong editorial article  
to the advocacy of the tunnel project. After  
showing the great need for such a work  
and its apparent practicability within a  
reasonable cost—the interest on which  
would be little if any more than the out-  
lay for the present wholly inadequate  
service—the Merchant concludes:  
"These, and all considerations, make it  
desirable that a thorough investi-  
gation should be made of the possi-  
bilities of the scheme at once. We  
even think that the situation warrants  
the Government taking immediate steps  
to provide the tunnel, for no one is san-  
guine that any other expedient can be  
made to serve the requirements of the  
case in the winter season."

### SYDNEY ENDORSES THE TUNNEL.

In pursuance of the plan adopted by the  
four delegates sent to Ottawa by the Pro-  
vincial Convention, special attention was  
given not only to influence the Govern-  
ment directly, but to arouse the mem-  
bers of Parliament individually and collec-  
tively to take an interest in our case, and  
also to reach the people of all parts of the  
country through the press, and through  
the leading Maritime Boards of Trade.  
The resolutions of the St. John and Hal-  
ifax Boards of Trade endorsing the tunnel  
scheme and the demand for an ice-break-  
ing steamer of great power have already  
been printed in these columns. This morn-  
ing we publish an account of like action  
by the Sydney Board of Trade, after the  
matter had been brought to their atten-  
tion by Hon. Joseph Read. In his energetic  
way, and with the array of facts at his  
disposal he proved irresistible and Sydney  
wheeled into line to enforce the demand  
for a tunnel.

Thus we have the public men, the press  
and the Boards of Trade of the sister  
Provinces heartily with us, ready for  
their own sake and for ours to urge the  
immediate construction of the one missing  
link in our interprovincial railway system.  
They all feel that this is an act of simple  
justice to our Island Province and the  
only means that promises full satisfaction  
all around. It seems a pity that there  
are still a few persons here who seem  
afraid that the Government may do  
too much for us. We have no such fears.  
The Province is only asking for simple  
justice, the fulfillment to the letter of the  
bond of union in regard to our means of  
communication with the rest of Canada  
and we are glad to hope that the Parlia-  
ment and people of the Dominion  
are disposed to recognise our just claims  
and fulfil the bond.

### WINTER COMMUNICATION.

It is understood that the Liberal mem-  
bers of the Legislature have considered a  
draft memorial to the Ottawa Government  
on the subject of our communication with  
the Mainland and that the same has been  
submitted to the Opposition members  
with a view to shaping, if possible such a  
state paper as may be unanimously en-  
dorsed by the House. We think this a  
most desirable course in the best interests  
of the Island. Never was there a better  
opportunity for the Legislature to voice  
effectively the earnest desire of the entire  
people in favor of the tunnel. The press  
and Boards of Trade of New Brunswick  
and Nova Scotia have endorsed the tunnel  
as the best and only adequate remedy for  
our winter isolation and for promoting  
inter-provincial trade and our Legislature  
ought not to ask for less.
