FREIGHTER WRECKED

SEATTLE, Nov. 10 — (CP) — A Coast Guard motor lifeboat removed the last crew members from the apparently doomed freighter Andaluca today. Increasing winds and heavy swells sweeping into the straits of Juan de Fuca hampered the 7,700-ton Panamanian ship. The Coast Guard's Neah Bay station reported the vessel was in grave danger of breaking up from the pounding and the weight of water in its holds. Other crew members were taken off four days ago, after the ship was driven in its engine room.

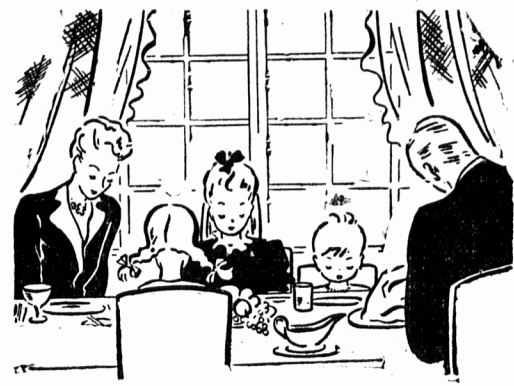

CAKE TALK

Cake-making is such fun — and it's really easy, too. But for unvarying success, you must be careful in selecting ingredients for your cakes.

Baking powder for example. Use up each tin before opening a new one, and buy a size of tin which you will use up in no more than a year, and preferably less than 6 months.

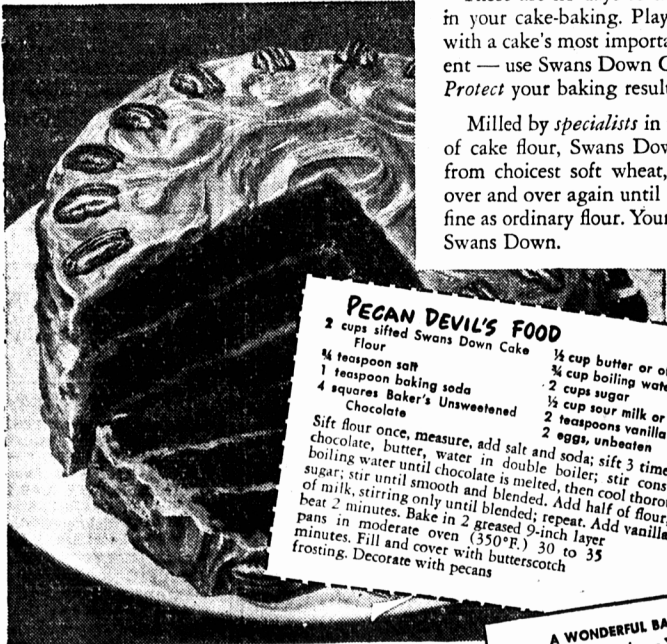
CAKE SERVING

Thought you would like our method of cutting the Pecan Devil's Food Cake illustrated here. Do use a sharp knife. The cake cuts into 8 pieces or as many as 32 modest ones.

For 8 large pieces, make 4 cuts from side to side, as illustrated. For 16 pieces continue step 2.

Starting at the outside of each cut, cut to half-way down the adjoining piece, as in dotted line.

For 32 pieces, make 8 cuts first, then cut diagonally half-way down each adjoining piece.

PECAN DEVIL'S FOOD
Flour
2 cups sifted Swans Down Cake Flour
1/4 cup butter or other shortening
1/2 cup boiling water
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup sour milk or buttermilk
2 teaspoons vanilla
2 eggs, unbeaten

Sift flour once, measure, add salt and soda, sift 3 times. Combine boiling water until chocolate is melted, stir constantly over sugar, stir until smooth and blended. Add half of flour, then half beat 2 minutes. Bake in 2 greased 9-inch layer pans in moderate oven (350°F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Fill and cover with butterscotch frosting. Decorate with pecans.
