Maritime Champs Are Outskated And Outplayed In Opener Of Series

Smooth-working, fast-skating Ottawa Canadiens junior team, champions of the Ottawa and Valley District, last night continued their superiority over the Maritime champions as they sent the Junior Royals down to a 12-3 defeat in the opening game of the Memorial Cup playdowns.

Taking the upper hand right from the opening whistle, Bill Cameron's Ottawa squad shot three goals in the first six minutes of the game; they added three more in the middle frame and then wound up their scoring spurge with six counters in the final session as the lighter and inexperienced Royals broke through for all their counters.

As a result of their one-sided victory, Canadiens are overwhelming favorites to advance against Montreal's Junior Royals in the Eastern Canada semi-final. Royals last night met their masters, and it was only their fighting spirit that enabled them to keep the score down to what it was.

But even in defeat, Walter Lawlor's young squad covered themselves with glory. All through the game they never gave up trying, even as the score mounted against them. Their efforts were rewarded in the last session as they spoiled the visiting goalie's effort for a shut-out with three hard-earned tallies.

WEAPON AGAINST MOTHS

NEW HAVEN, Conn., March 25.—Clothing moths cause more damage than Japanese beetles, according to Neely Turner, entomologist of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station. "Cleanliness," he advises, "is the best weapon of defense." Clothes that have been thoroughly washed in soap and water, or carefully drycleaned, are not as susceptible to damage as soiled woollens, furs, or feathers, said Turner. "For this reason all such things should be thoroughly cleaned before they are stored during the warm months of the year." Turner said that for some reason "the presence of dust makes clothing more attractive to moths." He said clothes should be carefully packed away in tight containers with a small amount of paradichlorobenzene as a fumigant.

Royals take Two-game lead

TORONTO, March 26.—(CP)—Montreal Royals, playing well within themselves most of the way, defeated Toronto Marlboros 3-2 here tonight to advance within a game of entry into the Eastern Canadian senior hockey final.

Victors 3-1 over the Marlboros in the first game of their best-of-five Eastern semi-final series Monday night in Montreal, the Montrealers came from behind in the second game to run up a 3-1 lead, then finally yielded a goal to the Toronto in the last minute of play. Cowley And Bauer Will Be In Boston Lineup Against Leafs Tonight

TORONTO, March 26.—(CP)—The way Sylvanus Apps slipped away from his doctor's care to demoralize Boston ranks sickened the Bruins last time out but they shook off some of the symptoms today when it was learned that their own great playmaker—Bill Cowley—will return to the Stanley Cup scoring champion of the National Hockey League and arch rival of Apps for the honor of being the game's greatest centre. Cowley nursed his injured knee on the sidelines last night as Syl lead Toronto to a 7-2 victory over the Bruins. An injury similar to Cowley's but probably more serious kept Apps on the shelf for a month but the lay-off didn't dull his effectiveness. The Toronto captain fired three of the Leafs' seven goals and helped in another to give the team a two game to one advantage in the best-of-seven semi-final cup round. Manager Art Ross said that Cowley and Bobby Bauer, clever little right winger who suffered a foot cut about the same time as Cowley

hurt his knee in the opening series game, both skated today and were declared ready to take their turns in the Boston cause. Bauer was used last night but his foot bothered him and he was rested in the final period when the Bruins' cause looked hopeless. "Cowley may be only 50 per cent efficient but even that should help a lot," said Ross. "Bauer should be stronger tomorrow night and along with Cowley's added punch will have enough to take them. We hope to go back to Boston for the Saturday game with the series all square." In the other camp, Coach Hap Day places no changes in the lineup that outskated and overpowered the Bruins last night, coming from behind twice to gain their lopsided verdict. Only Leafs to skate today were Lex Chisholm and Hank Goldup who did not play last night. "Tomorrow night's game is the most important of the series and if we can take it we're in," said Day. "If we win they'll have to take us three straight and I don't think any team could do that. But if we lose it's going to be tough, with two of the remaining games in Boston."
