Liberals Oppose P.E.I. Interests In House Commons

Potato Grading Regulations Opposed By Liberal Member Who Claims Request Of P. E. I. Potato Growers Would Be "Unfair To Consumers."

The following discussion took place in the House of Commons on June 19 when the House went into committee on Bill No. 87 to amend the Root Vegetables Act, sponsored by Hon. Mr. Weir, Minister of Agriculture, with Mr. Lavergne in the chair.

Mr. A. W. Neill (Lib. Comox-Alberni): Would the minister be kind enough to explain what influences him in deciding that new potatoes must be graded? It would appear to be rather a new departure.

Hon. Robert Weir, (Minister of Agriculture): We have received a number of requests from Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick that all potatoes there be graded. In addition to that we have these resolutions: resolutions by the Canadian Horticultural Council asking that new potatoes be brought under the same regulations as other potatoes; resolution by the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association; also resolutions by the South Essex Growers' Co-operative and the Central Ontario Potato Growers' Association.

change the grades. For instance, two years ago, we found in the potato business that potatoes for certified seed had to be graded up to a certain size, 2 1-4 inches and upwards, while table stock of the same type would be graded down to 1 7-8 inches for No. 1 grade. Certain seed growers shipped out all their potatoes over 2 1-4 inches for certified seed and then they could take the balance of that stock between 2 1-4 and 1 7-8 inches and make a full carload of No. 1 table stock, according to the regulations as they existed at the time. You can see how necessary it was to change those regulations, because a carload of potatoes consisting wholly of potatoes from 1 7-8 to 2 1-4 inches is of very inferior calibre, and nobody would accept it.

With reference to the remarks of the hon. member for Lisgar, while I was sitting on that side of the House for a number of years I consistently advocated a change in the grading regulations which would stop the importation of such trash as we see exhibited particularly in the months of April and May in the City of Ottawa, and practically every other city in the country.

LIBERAL CRITICISM

Mr. J. L. Brown (Lib. Lisgar): I think this is another way of attempting to do something which the Government attempted some time ago. It will be recalled that the Government passed an Order-in-Council fixing a price for duty purposes on potatoes. There was a great deal of protest against that Order-in-Council and the Government instead of rescinding it when the evils of it were pointed out, passed another Order-in-Council like the laws of the Medes and Persians, I suppose their orders are unchangeable. So they passed another Order-in-Council substituting radishes for potatoes. The effect of the first Order-in-Council was to put a heavy impost on new potatoes coming into this country. Objections were raised by American shippers, and these objections were endorsed by the potato growers of the Maritime Provinces who were accustomed to sell large quantities of seed potatoes to the United States, which trade was going to be endangered. By bringing down this amendment the Government is seeking to do in another way what they were prevented from doing in the first place. Now they are going to apply grading regulations in such a way that the small potatoes that come in in the early spring will be excluded because they will not come up to the grading regulations. As a matter of fact, that is the purpose of this bill. Instead of calling it an Act to amend the Root Vegetables Act we might as well call it an act to exclude new potatoes coming in from the United States.

LIBERAL MEMBER OPPOSES

Mr. E. J. Loung, (Lib. Weyburn): A few minutes ago the Prime Minister complained that speeches on this side of the House were being repeated from time to time. I think we have before us a good illustration of a case where speeches such as the one just made by my hon. friend from Lisgar should be repeated again and again by every member on this side of the House, not with the hope of impressing the Government very much, but at least to let the country know what is being done and what are the motives behind it. I remember some years ago when the tariff board was sitting, a gentleman appeared before that board and told them he had a cellar full of old carrots that he could not sell, and he wanted such tariff regulations enacted as would make it impossible for people in this country to buy new carrots until he had disposed of his old ones.

The object of this legislation is identically the same. At the time these new potatoes are coming into the country there are no new Canadian potatoes, but certain Canadian growers have old potatoes which they want to sell and so they want regulated regulations enacted making it impossible for anyone in this country to buy new potatoes until they have disposed of their old ones. My hon. friend from Kings says that these imported potatoes are trash. The people of this

ICED WATER BEST

Studies in keeping cream sweet made by the Dairy and Cold Storage Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, show conclusively that iced water not only keeps cream better than when it is placed in a refrigerator but that it takes considerably less ice. The reason for this lies in the fact that the iced water, being a better conductor than the cold air of the refrigerator, cools the cream more quickly.

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
