## HALIFAX MARKETS.

The produce market here has had a fair week, but the soft weather has had a bad effect on some shipments of meat and fowls, quite a quantity of the latter having arrived in a useless condition. Eggs continue to advance, and judging from the way dealers here are buying, there is no weakness anticipated in the market. Auld's are shipping large quantities to this market, one firm having received 400 cases in the past two weeks and others still larger quantities. The usual quotation here is 23 cents although 22 is also quoted. They are costing 21 cents F. O. B. Charlottetown, however, and one cent does not leave much margin after bringing them here. Bad weather on the Island has interfered with production and made receipts there small last week but they have improved somewhat since. Auld's say "stocks are being rapidly exhausted on our markets which are strong and advancing." Lined eggs from the Island and Antigonish are being offered in fair quality at 20 cents. There is a marked scarcity of good dairy butter. Small lots brought in by farmers in their wagons realize 18-20 cents. Rolls are coming in from Ontario and selling here at 19 cents. Nova Scotia creamery is very scarce, the factories getting 23 cents for it there. Canadian creamery is bringing 23 cents here. Cheese is dull here but firmly held at prices previously quoted. Pork is very plentiful and cheap, and some of it in rather bad condition owing to soft weather. It is coming in plentifully from the Island and sales have been made as low as 4-1-2 cents, with probably 5-1-2 the outside it would bring today. —Halifax Chronicle.

## BRITISH COAL FOR BALTIC FLEET MAKES JAPS SORE

LONDON, Nov. 26.—Baron Sheymatsu, son-in-law of Marquis Ito, president of the Japanese privy council, whose comment was fully endorsed by Baron Hayashi, the Japanese minister here, at the continued supply of British coal to vessels of the Russian second Pacific squadron said today:—  
 "We feel strongly that Europe in general is assisting Russia in a way we never contemplated. Although I do not think the Japanese are unduly nervous regarding the effect of the Russian squadron in the Far East, it would never have been able to put to sea but for the assistance of the subjects of the neutral states in some cases more or less officially connived at."  
 "Without English coal the Russian squadron could not have gone far and it is my belief that when contraband trade is being carried on such a wholesale and open fashion, the government concerned should take steps to prevent a continuance of action prejudicial to another nation, especially when that nation happens to be an ally."

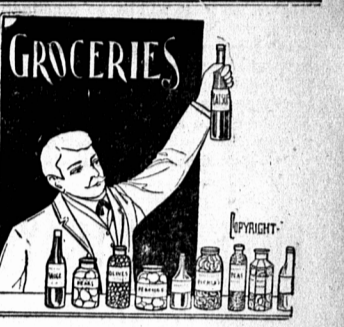
