## KING GOVERNMENT SURVIVES WANT OF CONFIDENCE VOTE

With the Aid of 14 Progressives and Several Independents the Shaw Sub-amendment was Defeated by a Majority of 38.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—The King government was sustained by a vote of 114 to 78 or a majority of 38 when the commons divided tonight on the Shaw sub-amendment to the address in reply to the speech from the throne. ## Woman Explorer Plans Wild Trip

LONDON, Feb. 8.—A party of four Americans, one of them a woman, has arrived at Southampton on their way to the Tanganyika territory in East Africa.  
The expedition is a highly dangerous undertaking and if the members succeed, Mrs. J. W. Clark, the wife of the leader, will be the first woman to get behind the arid belt which has baffled explorers and prevented an investigation of the highlands of the greater craters. It has been decided to travel by night, in order to avoid the dead-end of the day, and the party will make their way across the arid belt by the aid of lamps.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—General Geo. W. Goethals, State Fuel Administrator tonight was called upon by F. R. Wadleigh Federal Fuel Distributor to decide whether the shortage of fuel in this state would warrant an embargo upon anthracite shipments to Canada or justify the risk of an embargo which might put on electric power they supply industries in this State.  
The questions were raised in a letter to General Goethals received at his headquarters here. "I am in receipt of your letter of February 3rd relative to complaints in the eastern part of the state of New York with regard to the anthracite coal shipments to Canada," Mr. Wadleigh's letter said.

Evacuation of Memel Postponed Two Days

Hopes are entertained that the situation will be entirely cleared up by the end of that period.

Get Life Sentences for Helping Enemy  
PARIS, Feb. 8.—Ernest Judet and Hans Bossard were sentenced in their absence today to life imprisonment for trafficking with the enemy during the war, and charges of 58,329 francs 65 centimes, the expenses of the case, were levied against them. The sentences were the maximum allowed by the law as the accused men failed to present themselves for trial.

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
