IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN DOMINIC McDONALD

Many people throughout this province will learn with a feeling of genuine regret of the death at his home in Souris early yesterday morning of Captain Dominic McDonald, after an illness of only a few days, of pneumonia. Captain McDonald was a man of giant stature, being probably the largest man in Prince Edward Island. He was a man who made warm friends wherever he was known.
