Plans To Entertain Marshal Foch in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Final arrangements for the reception and entertainment of Marshal Foch on his forthcoming visit to the United States for the American Legion convention and the limitation of armament conference were made public here today by Alton T. Roberts, chairman of the Legion reception committee, who is to have charge of the noted Frenchman's tour.

The Marshal will arrive in New York October 29 aboard the liner Paris. Included in his party will be Gen. Desticker, chief of staff; Major Maury and Capt. L'Hopital, his personal aid, and Dr. Andre, his personal physician. Gen. Pershing and Brig. Gen. Conner, designated as the Marshal's military aid during his visit, and a legion committee will travel with the party.

Other distinguished figures who will come for the legion meeting, according to Mr. Roberts, are: Lord Beatty, Admiral of the British fleet; Armando Diaz, Generalissimo of the Italian army. Gen. Baron Jaque, commander in chief of the Belgian army, and Charles W. Betrand of the French Chamber of Deputies, who is head of the Interallied Veteran Organization, including the American Legion.

The Marshal will be tendered a reception in New York after which he will leave for Washington, where he will make a formal call on President Harding. Accompanied by Gen. Pershing and the representatives of the armies and navies of the allied Powers, the Marshal will leave for Kansas City, October 30, where he will appear before the American Legion on November 1. During his visit in Kansas City, Marshal Foch will dedicate the New Kansas City war memorial, review a parade of Legion men and be tendered an official banquet by Missouri and Kansas City officials.

Marshal Foch will visit St. Louis November 3, going from there to Indianapolis November 4, Chicago November 5, and Detroit November 7. On the way to Detroit, the Marshal will stop at Camp Custer to dedicate the Roosevelt Tubercular Hospital. Cleveland will be visited November 9 and Pittsburgh November 10. The Marshal reaching Washington again on the morning of Armistice Day to participate in the ceremonies for America's unknown dead at Arlington.

Grmans Unearth Treasure Trove

Weird Legend of Decapitated Pirate's Spirit Connected With Find

BERLIN, October 22.—A find of some interest is reported to have occurred recently in the neighborhood of Hamstadt, near Cuxhaven, and if the report proves to be correct the romantic story of the "Stoertebecker treasure" will be revived.

Experts have been set to Hamstadt to investigate the treasure, which is supposed to represent in value an amount of 20,000,000 marks (about £50,000), and there seems to be some ground to think that it actually may be the ancient treasure. This dates back to the 14th century.

The story is that it was amassed by Stoertebecker and Godecke Michal, the two leaders of a gang of pirates which flourished in the 14th century and preyed on the wealth of the rich merchantment of the Baltic and the German Ocean. The fame of the pirates and their secret cache survives to this day in old German folk-songs. The Hansa merchants especially, had a bad time until in 1402 they gathered together a strong fleet led by the good ship, Checkered Coy of Flanders, and in a decisive sea fight overcame and captured the pirates with their chief Stoertebecker. The prisoners were brought to Hamburg, confined, and were to be shot the following morning.

The legend goes on to relate that they stood in a long row, and Stoertebecker looked once more on all his friends, and, "because he loved them dearly," he begged the judge to spare the lives of those whom he could pass in running after he had been beheaded. The judge assented, and when Stoertebecker's head had fallen, the headless body actually (so the legend relates) ran past 15 of the condemned prisoners. The executioner, however, was afraid that all the prisoners would be saved, and threw a block of wood at the headless body and brought the body down. The treasure which the pirates had hidden was the subject of much research, but it has never been found. There is still some scepticism whether the find at Hamstadt may not have some other origin.

BAPTIST CONVENTION HAD TWO BUSY DAYS.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 18.—In the United Baptist Convention on Saturday afternoon the remaining clauses of the report of the treasurer of the board of governors were considered. The report shows total assets of \$1,566,551.88, with liabilities of \$89,800.

Dr. I. Boakes reported for the board of ministerial education, showing a total of \$1,640 paid in aid of students of the ministry.

The five-year programme committee reported through Rev. S. S. Poole, showing 2,494 baptisms during the year. Two hundred and twenty-four churches out of 583 report baptisms. The goal set five year ago—\$100,000 for denominational work—has been passed.

The educational goal of 1,000 students at Acadia has been reached. Commendable advance has been made along the lines of religious education.

From the forward movement about \$242,000 have been received. The additions to the churches by baptism during the five-year period were 9,635. The gifts for denominational work are greater by \$153,000 than during the preceding five year period. To this must be added the \$325,000 pledged in the forward movement campaign.

SKELETON SENSATION IN GREAT BRITAIN.
