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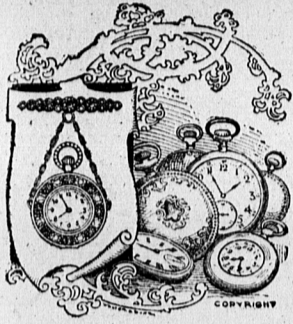

Quite a debate was precipitated in the House of Commons at Ottawa on Monday by the resolution of Mr. MacDonald (Pictou) calling for all papers and correspondence respecting the recent settlement with Manitoba by which the boundaries of that province are to be enlarged and she is to receive better financial terms. The prime minister refused to go into the details asked for by Mr. MacDonald, and Sir Wilfrid Laurier was unable to get up any debate upon the question in the territory to be annexed to Manitoba. Mr. Borden told him amid general applause and laughter, that he had on the best authority that the Manitoba school question had been settled in 1907. Several members of the maritime provinces, however, earnestly protested against additional territory being given to Manitoba or any other province unless the maritime provinces received some quid pro quo. George W. Fowler, M. P. for Kings and Albert, threatened to vote against this question if necessary, and he was cordially supported by A. A. Wlean (Queen's, P. E. I.) Hon. William Pugsley and Mr. Chisholm (Antigonish) concurred with these gentlemen in saying that the lands of the Northwest territory belonged to all the provinces of Canada and could not be given over to one or more provinces without the consent of the rest.
