She continues to run and manage the small newspaper that belonged to her late husband and Cordelia's fondest hope is of turning the paper over to her older son, Ronald, after he has completed his college education. Ronald takes over control of the sheet, but he has high-frown ideas and gets himself into hot water immediately, but he is too stubborn to accept the counsel of his wise mother. However, the result is a thoroughly enjoyable film.

Other members of the cast contributing excellent performances are Glen Boles, Barbara Weeks and Mary Korman.

Bright Girl Makes Good Air Pilot

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16.—Harold Wilson of the Aero Club of British Columbia, rated one of Canada's leading instructors, differs with an opinion attributed to Kenneth Mann, Toronto flying club instructor, that women make poor airplane pilots.

"Maybe eastern girls are different but we have always found that other things being equal women who take up flying for sport are every bit as capable as the men," Mr. Wilson said.

"It must be borne in mind, however, that the industry offers little future at present for women pilots other than for their own satisfaction."

The instructor said women suffer because of poor judgment of distance and speed. He also thought the masculinity of most flying clubs and similar organizations had retarded women from taking up flying.

"But, pupil for pupil, a bright girl will make just as good a pilot as a bright boy," Mr. Wilson said.

A SUBSTANTIAL DISH

Into a quickly boiling well-salted saucupan of water you put half a teacupful of rice for each person, and two or three large sliced onions, and carrots if liked. Canadian Buffalo Thrive in Parks

EDMONTON, Alb., Dec. 16.—The great herds of buffalo in Buffalo and Elk Island National Parks, both in Alberta, continue to thrive. According to their annual census the herd in the former reserve numbers 4,763 and in the latter 2,126, these figures being exclusive of the 1935 calf crop of about 1,200.

These buffalo are wards of the Dominion Government. So that the ranges may not be over-gazed, and to preserve the herds in a healthy condition, about 1,500 animals will be slaughtered this winter, their flesh and hides sold. A few years ago, when the Government bought a small herd in Montana, U. S. A., it was feared the buffalo faced extinction.
