On the 18th inst. Mrs. Nicholson, aged 72, widow of the late Angus Nicholson, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Collins of Glen William. She was the youngest of a very much respected family, two of whom still remain, Malcolm and Kenneth Martin of Healdersdale and Glen William. She leaves four daughters and several grand-children.

The remains of Murdock McDonald, formerly of Glen Martin, lately of South Boston, came over by the Earl Grey on Monday, accompanied by his grandson, Herbert Beers. The funeral took place on Tuesday from the home of E. C. and Mrs. McDonald of Commercial Cross, to the Valleyfield Cemetery. Mr. McDonald was 72 years of age. He was born in Isle of Skye, Scotland, and emigrated to this Province when twenty years of age. He was very highly respected by his many friends and acquaintances and leaves to mourn a large family, two sons in this Province, one on the Pacific Coast, one son and four daughters in New Hampshire and Massachusetts, also a large number of grand-children.

Louis Harris and Fletcher Jordan, Souris, have arrived home after the very thrilling experience of the night of the 17th, inst., as previously reported. They were out on the ice for fifteen hours during which time they were exposed to a high wind; snow and rain on the drift ice. Both were but thinly dressed at the time and being frost bitten. Their escape from danger through the ice was a feat on which they were floating broke up but they managed to jump ice cakes to a larger one. The old one was about 12 by 30 feet. They had with them their guns, ammunition and shot four ducks in the morning. The ducks they lost, but they saved their guns though one of these was broken while doing active service on the ice. The ice was so soft that the ducks were safe enough. The young man Lumsden who was with them escaped being carried to sea by taking a great risk in running ice cakes to the shore. Both men conformed to high standards of appearance and of gratefulness to the Captain, officers and crew of the Earl Grey, whose kind treatment after picking them up Saturday morning did so much to relieve their discomforts.

SPEAKER LOWTHER ACCUSED OF PARTIALITY

LONDON, Feb. 19.—Whatever action the House of Commons may decide to take on Monday in regard to the letter from Wegwood, accusing speaker Lowther with partiality, its ability to locate its own dignity is ample and far reaching. In fact, the powers of the house have apparently no limit beyond the restraint which decency may dictate and more than this its judgment is final. Premier Asquith correctly stated that there was no exact precedent bearing on the case of a private letter, but past records supply numerous instances, in which resolutions on the speaker have been followed by personal consequences. The closest parallel to the Wegwood-Ginell incident occurred some years ago, when a radical member was suspended from service in the house for one month for making an accusation of partiality against speaker at a public meeting.

HEALTH MATTERS TAKE SERIOUS TURN IN NEWCASTLE

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Feb. 18.—Health matters in this country have taken another serious turn. At a private session here the Northumberland County Council decided to vigorously oppose the action of the Provincial Board of Health in taking the control of health matters from the hands of the county representatives and vesting it entirely in the provincial appointee, Col. Maltby, Warden E. Parker, after the meeting here yesterday said that the county would not sanction the accounts of the provincial officer. The council has information that Dr. E. B. Fisher, secretary, took the initiative in the dismissal of the county representatives and that conditions did not warrant the action. His movement is considered as a reflection upon the Northumberland County Council as a whole. The Warden has letters from Premier Hazen, promising a full investigation and intimating that the provincial government did not countenance the recent action. Mayor McMurdo has announced his retirement from the chief magistrate's chair, to take effect in April. Mr. McMurdo recently toured Western Canada in company with James P. Whelan. He has decided to locate in Winnipeg, where he has secured an interest in a large manufacturing establishment. He will leave for the West in May. Mr. McMurdo has served six years in the Newcastle council, the last term as mayor. He is a young man and an assiduous worker in civic government.

There are still a very large number of cases of influenza in the county, the lumber camps being the chief infected districts. Chas. A. Haran, clerk in the Newcastle post office, is improving. The matter for the payment of the accounts for the fumigation of the post office has finally been adjusted. P. Keating has received word from the Public Works Department at Ottawa assuming the responsibility for execution of the work. The schools in Whitteville and Alton Settlement, taught by Miss Margaret Sobey and Miss Mabel Clouston, have been closed, the former owing to a serious outbreak of small-pox and the latter to measles.

WANT DAVID RUSSELL TO BARE HIS EVIDENCE

(Continued from page 1.) made by himself and Mr. McVainara of the Pinkerton force, one of the defendants, to the effect that the particulars demanded were necessary for making a proper defence. As matters now stood, he argued, the statement of claim filed on Mr. Russell's behalf was too indefinite, both as to the time of the alleged conspiracy to have the latter branded as insane and sent to an asylum, and also as to the persons charged with having taken part in the matter. He then went over a long list of the details on which information was demanded, including the names of the proposed witnesses and other data.

Strong opposition to the application was made by Messrs. Casgrain and Campbell, who took the ground that the motion was made to gain an end. It was also argued by Mr. Casgrain that the defendants had been dilatory throughout and that the motion should be invalidated on the ground that the affidavits had not been filed within the time allowed by the rules.

Mr. Russell's counsel took the position that the defendants were already given all the particulars necessary to their case, the more so as much of the information they asked, in the way of copies of reports made by Pinkerton men, must already be in their possession, since the Pinkertons would never send out reports without keeping duplicates.

Mr. Campbell, for Mr. Russell, objected to the demand of Mr. MacPherson for copies of reports furnished by Mr. Russell to agents of a New York detective agency, which had been employed by the latter to shadow the Pinkerton men for the purpose of securing material for the present action. Under such circumstances he claimed that these reports were privileged, and the defendants had no right to them.

TAMED BY CAMERA

The camera is gradually replacing the rifle as a weapon for sportsmen. It does not bag the dead carcasses of beasts, but it secures what is more valuable, a record of their appearance and habits in the living state. The very act of making the photographic "shot" also discovers traits in the wild subject that a powder-and-ball hunter would never suspect. Ernest Thompson-Seton tells in Scribner's of a surprising revelation concerning the lynx. One of those supposedly savage animals had been driven from cover and cornered by Seton and two Indians.

Preble, with characteristic loquacity, said, "Go ahead." Then I stopped and began slowly approaching the desperate creature we held at bay. His eyes were glaring green, his ears were back, his small bobtail kept twitching from side to side, and his growls grew harder and hissing as I neared him. At fifteen feet he gathered his legs under him, as for a spring, and I pressed the button, getting number three.

Then did the demon of ambition enter into my heart and lead me to peril. The lynx at bay was starving and desperate. He might spring at me, but I believed that if he did I would never reach me alive. I knew my man—this nerved me—and I said to him, "I'm not satisfied; I want to fill the finder. Are you ready?" "Yep."

So I crouched lower and came still nearer, and at twelve feet made a dash for it. For some strange reason, now, the lynx seemed less angry than he had been. "He didn't fill the finder. I'll try again," was my next. Then on my knees, I crawled up, watching the finder until it was full of lynx. I glanced at the beast, he was but eight feet away. I focused and fired; that lynx is alive, and well, and going yet.

We stood aside; he saw his chance and dashed for the tall timber. As he went, I fired the last film, getting number six, and so far as I know that lynx is alive, and well, and going yet.

FALLING HAIR.

If, in addition to being oily, the hair falls considerably, there is probably a diseased condition of the scalp. First see that there is no internal derangement, for if such should be the case and it is not properly overcome, all external treatment will prove long and tedious, and probably be of very little benefit. When the hair falls freely and without apparent cause, the hair and scalp should receive prompt and regular attention. After the abolutions above mentioned have been tried the following lotion should be well massaged into the scalp once a day, or at night. The regular heavy stimulating massage must not be adopted, as it would be too strenuous for so tender a scalp.

Procure one ounce each of alcoholic tincture of cantharides, spirits of rosemary, glycerin, aromatic vinegar, rose water and bay rum. Mix thoroughly and apply with a simple massage movement, which consists merely in holding the fingers firmly on different portions of the scalp and bending the knuckles so that the scalp moves, but the fingers remain stationary. This is so continued all over the head, the operation taking at least fifteen minutes. At the finish there should be a tingling sensation in the scalp. Then a final brushing is given and the hair loosely braided for the night. If the treatment is given during the day the hair should be arranged loosely for some time afterwards.

Of course, it must be understood that the results will not be gratifying where a pompadour cushion or extra hair is continually worn underneath the natural hair, for this extra hair so over-heats the scalp that the trouble is aggravated instead of lessened.
