The Minto was transferred to the Russian government to be used as a tea breaker in the White sea and sailed from Halifax a month ago to take up her new duties in the north. HAS RETURNED TO FRONT

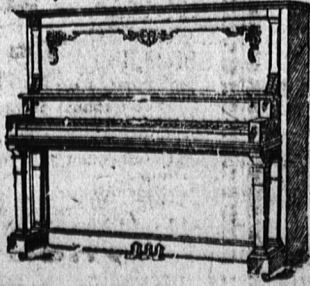
