The Charlottetown Steam Navigation Co. are making extensive repairs to their wharf.
The Princess arrived in port Saturday night at 8.30. She had a goodly number of passengers.
The schooner Kate, Capt. W. H. Davies is discharging a cargo of piles 55 and 60 feet long for the Bridge Co.
The Guardian learns that the increased pay to trackmen on the P. E. I. R. will take effect immediately.
The Rifle Club held practice Saturday afternoon preparatory for their match which will be fired next Saturday.
The buoy between Appletree Wharf and Battery Point was towed in to the wharf yesterday by a party in a boat.
Rev. J. A. Crawford is visiting in Prince Edward Island. Rev. Mr. McLeod of Charlottetown, will preach for him on Sunday.—Truro Daily News.
On the out-going train Saturday afternoon were many clergymen of the Roman Catholic Diocese, returning to their parishes after the closing of the retreat in St. Dunstan's College.
The Exhibition and Race posters are now about ready for distribution and will be posted up in a few days. The Secretary has ordered about double the usual number this year.
The repairs to the Steam Navigation Wharf have been completed. This makes the passage up the wharf much more convenient than formerly and the Princess is able to moor at this end of the wharf.

A Memorandum of July 23rd says: The department of Marine and Fisheries at Ottawa has recently addressed to those interested in the lobster fishery in this section a circular containing a series of seventeen questions bearing upon their industry and measures most largely to be effective in the preservation of what is of so much value to the people along the coast. Among the questions upon which suggestions are invited is one in regard to the setting apart of spawning reserves at intervals along the coast and another in regard to the exclusion of American packing establishments. Fishermen say that where formerly 18 and 20 inches was a common length for lobsters now it is 10 or less, and though they cannot notice any appreciable decrease in the numbers the last few years at all events, the crustacean is gradually getting smaller. This can mean only one thing in the end. Spawning reserves would probably be an assistant to the fishery, but the packers are pretty generally of the opinion that hatcheries should be established at all the centres of the industry. They cite the benefit from the Pictou hatchery, which has placed 120,000,000 lobsters in the waters of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, particularly in the Straits of Northumberland. It is understood that Prof. Prince is about to visit the Province for the purpose of erecting sites for other hatcheries, one or more of which will probably be located in Westmorland.

At the Police Court Saturday morning the case against Patrick Doherty for breach of the Prohibition Act, 1900 was resumed. The defendant Patrick Doherty, was present in court, he having in the morning been arrested by Police Officers Taylor and Harper on a warrant to apprehend issued by Stipendiary Magistrate Macdonald. After hearing read the evidence of the witnesses examined for the prosecution, Mr. Doherty made a written protest against the Stipendiary Magistrate's proceeding any further with the case on the grounds that the Magistrate had exceeded his jurisdiction and the warrant to apprehend him illegal, he appearing under constraint and force and against his will. The Magistrate held in a review of the evidence that a prima facie case had been made out against the defendant sufficient to put the defendant upon his defence under section 13 of the Act. The counsel for the defendant then moved that the case be adjourned in order to give the defendant time to offer evidence in rebuttal of the evidence given by the witnesses examined for the prosecution. His Honor granted the adjournment as he considered only a prima facie case had been made out by the prosecutor, and as the last evidence had only been received yesterday, it was but right that the defendant should have reasonable time in which to offer rebuttal to the evidence previously heard. The case was accordingly adjourned until Saturday next. Mr. Doherty was admitted to bail for the sum of six hundred dollars on his own recognizance.—Patriot.
