SOURIS NOTES.—Owing to inclemency of the weather, the farmers of this section have been unable to begin the spring's work at as early a date as formerly.—Somewhere about 40 vessels from Gloucester en route to Magdalen Isles to procure season's bate have been detained in this port, on account of large quantities of ice off the coast.—Mr. Robt. Deagle has captured a lobster 14 inches long from tail to claw, weighing seven pounds.—Mr. George Leslie has procured the assistance of Dominic Deagle as foreman of his lobster factory for this season, also the services of Mr. R. Blackett, former y of Grand River. Mr. Blackett being an experienced fisherman will no doubt do much to forward the interests of Mr. Leslie.

EASTERN NOTES.—If ever winter was noted for its mildness and want of snow, our spring is noted for its wintry and backward condition. Though approaching the middle of May the weather keeps remarkably cold, retarding farm operations, and hindering the works of the husbandman. Fencing cannot be done properly on account of frost in the ground, and the nights are as cold as in the middle of April.—A few potatoes have been planted and Mr. William McLean has sown a field of wheat.—The ice has left the coast but the herring are extremely scarce and cod-fish have not yet put in an appearance.—John Ryan had the unusual experience of finding the carcass of a white horse with a red box sleigh attached floating off the shore of Priest Pond a few days ago. He removed the harness but the sleigh sank. He likely went through the ice in some of the western bays, floated out the harbor to the sea and then east in this direction.—Machine agents, pedlers and oriental vendors of small wares are beginning to make their visits to the hospitable inhabitants of this section. As the news arrived that the Farquharson Administration was broken some of our local political aspirants at once began preparing for the field, but late news dispelled their prospects of political advancement.

ALCOHOLIC CANDIES.

Sold in Montreal Confectionary Stores.—Deplorable Results.

(Montreal Witness.)

For weeks past some ladies of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of this city have been looking into the question of the sale of candies containing alcohol. They purchased the suspected sweets and gave them to their friends who were rather hard to convince. Some said they were uncommonly nasty but they did not think the disagreeable flavor was due to alcohol. Several thought that Montrealers were not yet depraved enough to encourage anything of the sort while still others said there might be a trace of alcohol in them, but it was probably due altogether to the flavoring extracts used and as everybody knew these were chiefly alcoholic tinctures.

But the ladies were not satisfied. They bought more and sent them to a well known public analyst, from whom they got back the statement that the sweets had been analyzed and found to contain 2.17 per cent of absolute alcohol. Then more Montrealers said, "But these candies surely were never made in Montreal. They are brought here from outside." So more enquiries were made. Three well known West End confectioners did not keep them at all. Another did not keep them on hand, but "would make them for the ladies tomorrow, for seventy-five cents a pound. Another said it was too late in the season. "Yes, they kept them on hand all winter, made them themselves, in fact, but it was now getting too late. Any the ladies could find in the stores now would be old stock."

Some they did find, however, and without any trouble, in two other stores. Whether new stock or old they did not enquire. But such as they were the public analyst distilled from them nearly two and a quarter per cent of pure alcohol.

MISCHIEF AMONG YOUNG PEOPLE.

And now to the innocent citizens of Montreal who would not believe that such candies could even be bought here came further stories of their mischief.

One story is that three small boys were found drunk in the east end. They all belonged to respectable families and when questioned confessed that they had been indulging in brandy drops. Another story given by a French paper is that these sweets are very popular among certain classes of women who indulge in them freely when at theatre or concert, and that recently the audience of a popular theatre was scandalized by seeing three ladies of good social standing all so intoxicated that they had to be sent home in a cab.

The W.C.T.U. of New York city is reported to have just made a successful crusade against the sale of brandy drops in the neighborhood of public school 57. The sale was stopped by two or the seventy-two deputy sheriffs appointed by Sheriff Watson at the request of the W. C. T. U., and other allied organizations.

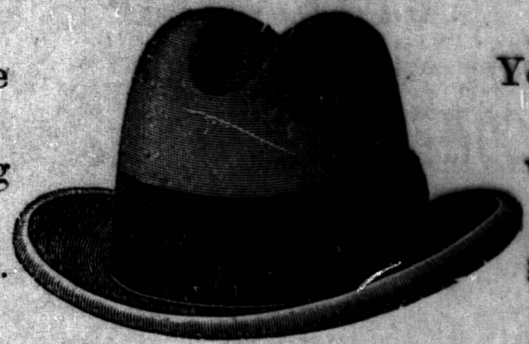
