Water Dept. Protest Ruling

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 11.—The Water Department last evening ordered an appeal to the P. E. A. U. of C. against the ruling of the New Brunswick Amateur Baseball Association, declaring the Chatham team winners by default of the first game of the series. The appeal was based on the ground that at the time the forfeited game was ordered played the series between the Water Department and the C. U. team had not been decided, and that the Saint John team was therefore not eligible to compete against Chatham in the next round of the provincial play-offs.

The Chatham team were ordered to play here on Labor Day, but owing to President Gallivan, of the Miramichi League, advising Manager McLeod of the Water Department that Chatham had not been ordered to Saint John the home team were not ready for the game. Chatham appeared and claimed the contest by default and their claim was allowed by the N. B. A. B. A.

Says Trottier Will Play for Toronto Club

MONTEAL, Sept. 11.—"As far as I know, Dave Trottier, if he turns professional, will play with the Toronto Maple Leafs."

This was the statement made by Connie Smythe, manager of Toronto Hockey Club, when he was questioned about the reported trouble over Trottier.

Harness Racing Campaigners

FINAL LEG OF 1928 HARNESS RACING CAMPAIGN STARTS WITH ST. STEPHEN EXHIBITION THIS WEEK, FOLLOWED BY FREDERICTON AND WOODSTOCK LARGEST FIELDS IN RACING AT NEW BRUNSWICK FAIRS INDICATED BY BIG ENTRY LIST

The Maine and New Brunswick Circuit campaigners are back on Canadian soil, having crossed the border again for the three New Brunswick fairs that are members of the Circuit. This week they race at St. Stephens on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and Fredericton and Woodstock Exhibitions follow the succeeding weeks, winding up the Circuit season.

There is every indication that the St. Stephen, Fredericton and Woodstock Exhibitions will have the best racing seen at the fall fairs in this province for years, for the Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia exhibitions are now over and the pick of the racing material from the eastern tracks of the Maritime Provinces will meet of the Maine & New Brunswick Circuit regulars while there will also be a group of invaders from Massachusetts and Vermont which have taken advantage of the relinquishing of the restriction that kept outside stables away from the Circuit's summer meetings.

Moreover for the first time in years the St. Stephen Exhibition does not clash in dates with Woodstock or any other fair and the advantages of this happy situation are evident in the exceptionally large entry list which Secretary Frank Littlefield of the St. Stephen Fair Race Committee received for the three days racing on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week. The list is fully twice as large as in previous years as a result of there being no clash in dates and the most generous racing conditions ever offered at fall fairs, including no entrance charges on horses starting but not winning money.

The St. Stephen entry list shows a total of 171 entries, but even allowing for duplications the list of exceptionally large and extra stalls have had to be constructed at the last minute to accommodate the horses. The largest lists are for the 224 trot and pace and the 217 trot and pace in each of which 27 horses have been named, while the 219 trot and pace is not far behind with 24 entries. Even the three year old colt race attracted a big entry list, there being nine juveniles entering in that event. When it comes down to actual starters there will be plenty; take the 214 trot in which four or five starters have been named, and the indications are that there will be either seven or eight actual starters, Peter Will Tell, Jack Dempsey, Ella Watts, Belle Harvestworth, Bonnie Girl and Katherine Claude, Jeanette Royal, 2:06 1/2, the Canadian bred mare which was brought down to the Northern Maine Fair at Presque Isle by Allen J. Wilson, president of the Metropolitan Driving Club of Boston and former president of the Bay State Circuit, is going to remain on the Maine & New Brunswick Circuit for the three remaining fairs in New Brunswick and thus she will have

INTERNATIONAL HIGHWAY MAP SHOWS ROAD TO CANADA

mobiles guide book then serve the purpose of amplifying and filling in the details of the trip.

For those contemplating a visit or tour across the International Boundary, the new issue of sectional road maps issued by the Department of the Interior at Ottawa, Canada, is designed to serve the purpose of the broader planning. There has recently reached this office a copy of the sheet showing the principal roads in this territory and

the connecting highways between both countries will be at once apparent.

The four sheets which make up the series are the "Atlantic," the "Great Lakes," the "Middle West" and the "Pacific." A general map of the whole international border on a scale of 100 miles to the inch is also published. We are informed that copies of any or all of these maps may be secured without charge to those who are planning a vacation or business tour in either of the Interior, at Ottawa, Canada.
