U. S. To Repair
Norwegian Ships

WASHINGTON, July 12 (AP)—Norwegian merchant ships will be armed and repaired at the expense of the United States government and the armament thus provided may be manned by American gun crews if found mutually desirable under a lend-lease agreement signed Saturday by the two governments.

The United States also agreed to assist Norway in a program of ship replacement "as soon as conditions permit."

There was a good attendance at the morning service. The flowers at and around the pulpit represented the best and finest of our hearers' desire to worship acceptably. Before the regular sermon Rev. Dr. Miller gave a memorial tribute to the late Corporal William F. Collins, R.C.A.F., at the close of which the congregation stood in silence followed by the singing of the National Anthem.

Dr. Miller's text was from 1 Chron. 22: 7-8 "As for me it was in my mind to build an house unto the name of the Lord, my God: But David desired to erect a fitting house to the glory of God. His desire was not to be realized. He had shed innocent blood. The house was to be of the best material and workmanship. He who build it was to be of unblemished character.

Our frustrated ambitions may be due to our unwillingness and neglect of the mercy of God. Again they may be the result of our unchristian society in which the weak are sacrificed to the strong, where words are exalted and selfishness condemned.

God gives credit to the deserved. Good intentions are recognized. "Man and the intentions of his soul are good pictures of a paragon object" declared Da Vinci.
