SOME BRITISH PRECEDENTS.

The St. John Telegraph which strongly supports the ministerial end of the Dundonald controversy, cites some British precedents for the action of the Canadian Government in the premises. One of these is the case of Lord Charles Beresford, who is, perhaps as eminent in the service as Lord Dundonald, the other that of General Buller. The Telegraph proceeds:

"Lord Charles, however, won for himself at one time something of the universal reputation of a 'sea lawyer.' In 1900, when he was in command on the Mediterranean station, he wrote a letter criticizing the British admiralty. The publication of this letter aroused a storm of objection in both houses of Parliament, and Lord Beresford only escaped dismissal from the service by proving that it was published without his permission and apologizing for writing it. Lord Charles Beresford was one of the idols of the service, a man of acknowledged achievements and wide influence. He took his medicine, and public opinion in England regarded the draught as necessary, if bitter."

"More recent and resembling more closely that of Lord Dundonald, is the case of General Sir Redvers Buller. His circle of influence was very great. His military rank was high. There were many who held that he had been ill-used. At a luncheon where army men were guests he criticized his superiors. He was removed from his command as soon as the facts were established in form."

If in England Lord Charles Beresford might not criticize the superior authorities of the naval service with impunity, except by explanation and apology, why should Lord Dundonald be more favored in Canada? Sir Redvers Buller distinctly outranked Lord Dundonald, and was entrusted with the conduct of a great campaign. True, he did not succeed very well, and was so doubt somewhat embittered by unfriendly criticism of his methods. But when he ventured in turn to criticize his superiors at a military luncheon and the fact was fully established he paid the penalty. His offence was against sound public policy and destructive of military discipline. So was that of Lord Dundonald. The difference be-

THE METHODIST CONFERENCE

Opened at Fredericton With Good Attendance

Delegates Constantly Arriving and the Conference is Well Represented in 20th Annual Session.

The conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island opened in Fredericton, N. B., Thursday morning at 9:30 o'clock. After devotional exercises for half an hour led by President Berrie, the conference roll was called and 73 ministers and 26 laymen answered to their names.

Rev. C. W. Hamilton of St. John was on the third ballot, elected President of the Conference for the ensuing year and Rev. G. M. Young of Charlottetown was elected Secretary. Rev. H. Harrison was appointed Statistical Secretary and Rev. George F. Dawson, Journal Secretary. The credentials of the Rev. J. T. Binfield of New Zealand having been read, he was introduced to the conference and gave an interesting address.

A good deal of routine business was transacted during the day and the conference adjourned at 4 p. m. to give the different committees an opportunity to meet.

An open session of the conference was held at 8 p. m. at which the missionary interests of the church were discussed. Interesting addresses upon the subject were delivered by Rev. James Strothard and Dr. Sutherland and the report of the missionary committee was submitted.

Mrs. Coulthard, on behalf of the Woman's Missionary Society, of the Church also spoke and made a very good impression on the large audience present. Through the day a number of delegates arrived and the conference is well represented in its 20th annual session.

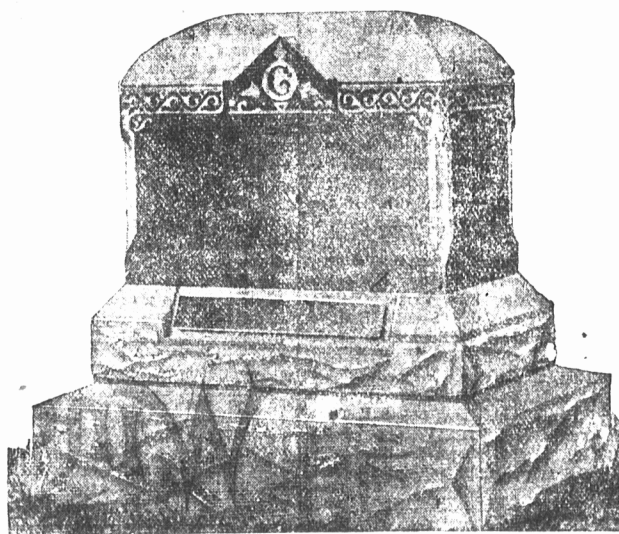
