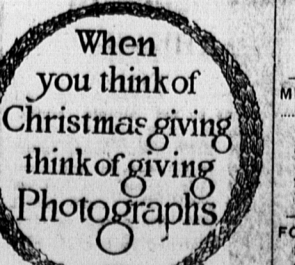

With the discovery of the circulation of the blood by William Harvey in 1628, began experimental medicine.
