AGAINST IMMIGRATION.

The Dominion Trades Congress, recently in session in Montreal adopted a resolution in condemnation of the Government's immigration policy, aimed especially against the influx of Galicians and Doukhobors. The Congress in this has adopted a rather narrow policy, which no doubt arises from its internal composition, made up as it is of those engaged in labor and handicrafts mainly in cities. These classes have always been jealous of the importation of workers from other countries, who might come in competition with them in their own field.

But it is to be observed that the Galicians and Doukhobors have not come to this country to compete in the ordinary labor market at all. They are by birth and association tillers of the soil. They come from the farms and peasant villages of Russia and Galicia to settle directly on the vacant lands of our vast Northwest territories. Agricultural settlers are precisely what is needed in Canada, if our great heritage is to be occupied and tilled. We would prefer settlers from the British Isles, who speak our own language and are accustomed to our free British institutions, but of those who come to us from the British Isles a large proportion remain in the cities, towns and villages and enter into competition with our own artisans and laborers in a field that is already fully supplied with workers.

The people whom the Trades and Labor Congress represent are of the class who will not go out on the prairies, or into the forest and take up land for themselves. Their objection to the Doukhobors, Galicians and Mennonites therefore comes with a very ill grace. These foreigners settle upon the vacant lands; they do not to any considerable extent compete in the ordinary labor market, and they will in the end, by increasing the population of the Northwest, improve the home market for almost everything that labor produces.

The Doukhobors, Galicians, Mennonites and Icelanders have come to Canada and settled upon our unoccupied lands. They are reclaiming the waste places, adding to the volume of our boasted big harvests and are helping to build up our great Dominion. Let us give them a fair chance and not judge them too harshly, even if, as in our native population, a few black sheep are found amongst them. The policy that would exclude them is a narrow and selfish one, and the country at large will not be found in accord with the object of the Congress resolution above referred to.

The Orange Free State as an ally of the Transvaal does not appear so very formidable when it is known that in 1890 its total white population was considerably less than that of P. E. Island. Though their country possesses some mineral wealth, little or nothing has been done to develop it. The wealth of the Burghers consists of flocks and herds fed on the rich grasses which abound at certain seasons, but for a large portion of the year long-continued droughts prevail, and water must be artificially stored to keep the domestic animals alive.

Wedding Bells.

The First Methodist Church was this morning the scene of a brilliant gathering and most impressive ceremony. The occasion was the marriage of Miss Daisy Caroline Lewis, daughter of our respected townsman John Lewis Esq. and Richard McKay, youngest son of Doctor Richard Johnson.

The altar was elaborately decorated with potted ferns and plants, the whole choir front being hidden by the foliage. Punctually at 8 10 A. M. the opening strains of the bridal music from Lohengrin rang out from the organ, and a few minutes later the bride appeared, leaning on her father's arm. She was arrayed in a very becoming tailor made suit of prune cloth with white silk trimmings, and carried a bouquet of white roses, and was indeed a beautiful bride. As the procession slowly moved up the aisle the choir sang that beautiful nuptial hymn "The Voice that breathed o'er Eden", and later in the service that sacred protestation, "How welcome was the call."

The ceremony was performed by the Rev. J. J. Teasdale, the organ playing a soft accompaniment throughout (except in the prayers). At the conclusion of the ceremony Mendelssohn's Wedding March pealed forth and brought to a conclusion one of the most elaborate wedding services ever held in the church.

Both the young people are members of the choir and their fellow choristers were out in force. The hymns were certainly not the least impressive part of a most solemn and memorable service. Professor Watts presided at the organ with his accustomed skill.

Scores of handsome and costly presents marked the high esteem in which the bride is held. The choir's tribute was a handsome oak hat rack, with bevelled mirror, etc. The Sunday School class which Miss Lewis teaches presented a beautiful jardiniere, the teachers also contributing a sterling silver salver as a token of their esteem. The bridesmaids were Miss May G. Dawson, daughter of ex Mayor Dawson, who was gowned in a tailor made suit of blue with white trimmings and Miss Annie Johnson, sister of the groom, whose dress was a handsome blue brocade. The groom was attended by Mr. John L. Lewis, brother of the bride. The ushers were Messrs Louis G. Whelan and Fred P. Newson.

The esteem in which the young couple are held was evidenced by the many presents which came from far and near. The groom was the recipient of congratulatory addresses from the societies in which he holds positions of responsibility.
