N. S. GETS HORSE

Nova Scotia has another valuable trotting stallion added to its breeding interests with the purchase of Spurgeon Gammon, the well-known New Glasgow horseman, of Reamore, 2.13 1/4, which he bought from H. B. Rea, Reamore Farm, Valencia, Penn. Reamore's breeding is of the most fashionable lines, he being sired by the famed Guy Axworthy, 2.08 1/4, sire of four two-minute trotters and the head of the greatest family of extreme performers the harness horse breeding world has ever known, his dam being Maru (dam of four with records better than 2.13) by Peter the Great, 2.07 1/4, the world's greatest extreme speed sire. His grand-sire was Harvest Queen by Arion, 2.07 1/2, and his third dam was Expedition, 2.15 1/4, by Electioneer. Reamore is a bright boy and a stylish horse in harness, being above the average in conformation and bears a close resemblance to his sire. He is eleven years old and got his win race record of 2.13 1/4 as a three-year-old over a half-mile track. He has not been used a great deal in the stud, but has

B., Sept. 27.—(By The Canadian Press)—St. Stephen Kiwanis' defense of their Maritime senior amateur baseball championship began auspiciously today with an 8 to 1 triumph over Charlottetown Abegweits, Prince Edward Island title holders in the first tilt of a three game semi-final series. Kiwanis timely hitting and wildness on the part of the Island hurriers accounted for the local runs.
