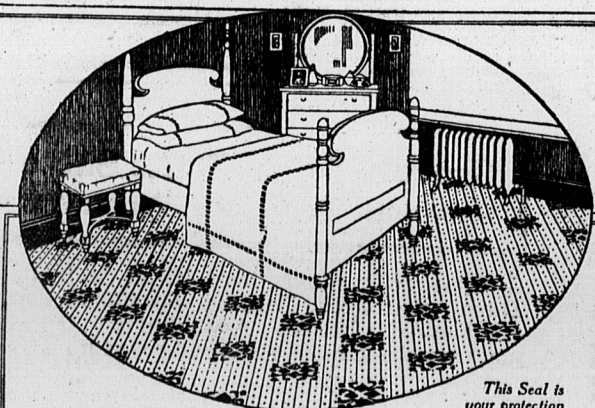

Shipping News

S. S. SERVICE BETWEEN BOSTON AND ST. JOHN TO BE RESUMED

The recent report that the Eastern Steamship Company would resume their trips along the Maine coast about April 1 and that the former schedule between Boston and St. John, via Lubec and Eastport would be started up for the balance of the year is pleasant news for the many people in Portland (Me.) who have missed the continued service since it was discontinued last December. It is stated that one of the principal reasons for the present very high prices asked for fruits, foods, etc. in Portland is owing to the express charges on these shipments, but with the coming on of the old established steamship line, there should be a big drop in prices.

Shipping business at New York is facing more trouble, leaders of the New York Marine workers' Affiliation having presented demands to the Boat Owners Association for a reduction in the working hours and increased pay. Chairman Russell of the Boat Owners' committee, declares that the men, considering the reduction in the number of hours, are asking for an increase of from 70 to 100 per cent. The old contract between the union and the boat owners expired March 1.

BOHEMIAN MAY BE TOTAL WRECK

The Leyland steamer Bohemian, which struck on Sambro Ledges during a blinding snow storm early Monday morning, will probably be a total wreck. Captain Hiscoe, the commander of the steamer wired the local agents in Halifax Monday night that the prospects were very poor.

The ship is in a dangerous position and although she continues to remain on an even keel, she is pounding heavily. Here forward holds are full of water to the Orlop deck.

Enroute from Boston to Liverpool, the Bohemian, one of the best known transatlantic liners calling at Halifax, was ordered to come to Halifax for bunker coal, owing to the scarcity that exists in Boston. She had been in Halifax sixteen days previous while westward bound to that American port, calling to land some two thousand Chinese Coolies, and on the night of Friday, Jan 13th steamed out of the harbor, passing the position where she now rests on the rocks.

Leaving Boston on Saturday she was expected to make Halifax early Monday morning. As she approached the entrance to Halifax Harbor a heavy snowstorm was encountered. Her speed was slackened and it was while slowly navigating her way to the point where the pilot would board her that the Bohemian struck on the Broad Breakers, which is a little westward of the "Blind Sisters."

It was about three o'clock when the Bohemian struck the rocks. The impact was not heavy. Her officers immediately sent out an S. G. S. call, and ordered the 64 passengers, who were in their bunks aroused. Immediately the Bohemian's wireless operator flashed out the S. O. S. signal and sent into Halifax. The Furness Liner Maplemore, from Portland, was dropping anchor in the stream, when she intercepted the call, and immediately Captain Fortune, started to the aid of the Bohemian. Arriving within a few hundred yards of her he inquired of Captain Hiscoe if he desired his passengers rescued, and was requested by the latter to stand by until daybreak, which was done. When the tug F. W. Roebling arrived the Maplemore returned to Halifax.

Line, and George Foston who directed them to the Halifax Hotel, where arrangements for their comfort had been provided. When the tug left for the wreck at five o'clock Monday morning James Kelly, Boss Stewards of the White Star Line went on one of them and is still on board the Bohemian directing the salvage of the cargo in Number One Hold. Immediately on landing the passengers, which stated that there was wreck, and remained alongside all day and Monday night. The Bohemian appears to be near two hundred feet ashore. Her bow is towards Halifax and she is about half a mile distant. About eight o'clock Monday night a message was received by the A. G. Jones and Company from the ship, which stated that there was water in Number 4 hold to the top deck. A heavy swell was running and the ship was pounding heavily. Monday afternoon the tug Leary Lee arrived from the steamer with all the baggage belonging to passengers, and each received his or her property. The passengers will remain at the Halifax Hotel, until the steamer sails for Liverpool.
