DREAM OF WINTERING ON THE VISTULA IS OVER

LONDON Nov. 3.—Colonel Repington, the London Times expert, cables as follows:—

It is questionable whether the particular kind of fighting upon which the Germans are now engaged is particularly suitable for their troops, especially those new levies. Even in 1870, despite greatly superior forces, the Germans found frontal attacks difficult. They made a specialty of flank attacks, and succeeded again and again. There is now no opportunity for the favourite German tactics, and everywhere they are faced by the dreaded parallel battle and are not making much out of it. Their losses during the three months must be at a rate of 200,000 a month, excluding prisoners and the collisions with the main Russian forces which began only a fortnight ago.

Even if the Allies' line is driven back in France, each part has prepared positions in the rear, where the struggle would recommence and the German troops would have to retrace their attacks and more solid field works and obstacles than those now in their front.

Pursuits in modern war are the most difficult of all operations, and what the Germans have to face in France is a succession of costly attacks which will in time wear them out. They are gambling for success by employing these new formations so early in the war, hoping against hope that victory may shine upon them soon, but for nearly two months no success has been gained, and though France is now honoured by the chief attention of Germany once more, there is no German gain to compensate for the reckless and continuous expenditure of life.

The Allies are not even shaken, and in the rear of them are preparing to march to battle many new and excellent troops.

This engagement by Germany of the mass of new troops in France ceased the loss of the campaign in

Poland. The dream of wintering upon the Vistula is at an end.

There was a moment when it seemed that it might be difficult for the Great Duke Nicholas to pass across the river sufficient troops in time to prevent Germans from establishing themselves upon the left bank, but this moment is long past and the Russian armies are now in full movement on the broad front towards the Warta and in Silesia. How many Russians are in the field we may not say, but correspondents with the Russian army declare there are nearly ten times as many as Napoleon led across the Niemen in 1812.

WOULD LIKE TO SEE MORE CANADIAN-BORN IN THE FIGHTING LINE.

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—That Turkey, by entering the war on the side of Germany, had committed suicide, and that Turkey by her action had forfeited her sovereignty of Egypt were the opinions expressed by Sir Henry Johnston, the famous scientist, explorer and pro-consul, before the Ottawa Canadian Club on Friday. Sir Henry expressed the opinion that Germany was hopeful that the entrance of Turkey into the struggle would result in revolts in Egypt and India. He had no doubts as to the loyalty of India and the ability of Great Britain to handle the Egyptian situation.

The Critical Point.

However, these were both outside considerations. The great struggle was along the coast of Northern France and in Belgium. This was where the war would be fought to an issue and the critical point, for if Germany secured control of the coast it would be a serious matter. Sir Henry was under the impression that Canadians did not realise the seriousness of the struggle. The first contingent, he declared, only contained fifteen per cent. native-born Canadians. Welcome as it was, he would like to see more live-born Canadians in the fighting line.

Some Possible Results.

He added that there would be great changes as the outcome of the war. One would be the liberalising of Russia, which was already shaking off its shackles. Russia, when the war was over, would undoubtedly claim access to the Mediterranean, and with a free Russia he thought Great Britain had nothing to fear. Another outcome of the war would be a more liberal Government for India. India was entitled to greater self-government, and it could not be refused when the war was over. A reasonable section of the people should have a reasonable voice in its Government, he concluded.

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NORTH SEA CLOSED TO COMMERCE.

Notice Regarding Dressing Hogs

As a result of Government Inspection it is absolutely necessary that more attention be given to dressing hogs for market in order to avoid refusal by Inspectors. They insist that the head, ears and feet should be thoroughly cleaned, every hair removed, the carcass carefully washed and kept perfectly clean when handling. Some few farmers are not splitting the hogs between the hams and are leaving the bung gut—and in some cases even the manure—in. This must be remedied also, and in future a reduction of 2 lbs. per hog will be made on all hogs reaching here dressed in this manner, as to say the least it does not look well. Hogs must be split down completely, and bung gut and refuse removed. We want to build up a reputation for Island Hog products, and can do so only with your co-operation.


